BOYS ON EDGE FOR THANKSGIVING DAY GRID BATTLES

Climaxing the 1945 Football season, N.B.C. will hold its annual Thanksgiving Day Football Program at Paul Revere Park, Thursday, November 22. Twelve games will be played throughout the morning; six teams taking the gridirons every hour starting at 9 o'clock. Each team plays a close rival, and in two leagues, the championship race will probably be decided on Thanksgiving Day games in which championships will also depend on the outcome will be hard fought, for a victory on this day can make up for some bad luck earlier in the season. The boys will be in top shape for these games, and their plays should be clicking to perfection after the break. As well as scores and highlights of the various games will be announced over a public address system. In addition, college songs will be played before all games and between them.

ALL BOYS ARE TO ALL THE BOYS: Your team should be ready to play at least one-half hour before the game scheduled for your game. Members of the various teams must board their始末の車 by 8:30 a.m. and will be waiting at the rear door of the fieldhouse. Before each game the national anthem will be played, and all boys are to stand at attention holding their hats in one hand. Immediately afterwards, the opening whistle will start the action. No popcorn because this year, hot chocolate will be served to your team either before or after your game -- you can choose either time. This added attraction will certainly be welcome if the day is as cold as it has been for the last few years.

GRIDIRON NO. 1

REVERES VS RAIDERS: Every time these two teams play, it's a wide-open game with plenty of scoring. But until their last meeting, all the scoring was done by the first-place Raiders, who have just about cinched their fourth N.B.C. football title. Last time it was a different story, however, as the fast-improving Reveres scored two touchdowns in losing, 27-12. This was the first time in three seasons that the Raiders had been scored upon twice in the same game. The Raiders use the T-formation very successfully. Quarterback Ray McDonald directs the offense, and fullback John Adam and Cliff Farrell, shift-half-back, are two of the best runners in the league. With a hard-charging line led by Bob Schaeffer, Bob Simons, Ralph Stahl, and Dick Geckley, to open holes to the backfield, the Raiders have been undefeated this season. In Frank Schnitz, the Reveres have one of the best offensive and defensive ends and the best punter in the Junior League. Norm Koetel, "Dutch" Deuschle, "Fay" Reith, John Scheible and Robert Schmitt are the Reveres' best linemen. In their backfield, which runs off the single play exclusively, the Reveres have four good runners in Rudy Klopitsch, Ray Kimball, Don Shoars and Ray Irshier. Kimball is also the Reveres' passing ace. This should be another wide-open contest and an interesting game to watch.

SEABEES VS BEARS: Second place in the Junior League will probably go to the winner of this game. Neither team has had a decided advantage over the other this year; so this should be one of the most evenly matched games of the day. The Seabees line is more outstanding than its backfield. Al Parker and Andy Butler are two of the three best guards in the league, especially on defense. In addition, the Seabees have Jim Martin, Jack Cronin, and Bill Modell to stand out in the line in Junior League competition. Modell's punting has also been outstanding this season. In the backfield, Bill Lindahl, "Tomato-face" Olson, and Jack Jensen form a strong defensive secondary, and Olson and Jensen have lagged the mail with some success this season off three formations - the T, single wing, and short punt formation. On the Bears' side of the fence, Louis Klauck is one of the best all-around backs in his league. The Bears' line, while not as outstanding as the Seabees' is still strong. Look for a hard-fought, close game with not much scoring.

THANKSGIVING DAY FOOTBALL CLASSICS KICK-OFF at 9 A.M.



11:00 A.M. NAVY VS GREMLINS: These two teams have been fighting for first place in the Frosh Division ever since the first day of the season. Although the Gremlins are on top at the present time, a Navy victory in this game would make it a two-way race to the finish. If the Gremlins should come out victorious it would practically clinch the championship for them. The Gremlins have an outstanding backfield led by the hard-driving Tommy Richards, Don Olberg, Fritz Harris and Bruce Lund. Their line, perhaps the best in the league, is sparked by Capt. Mel Bandanza, Semler, Durand and MacPhillary; they're always making it easy for their backs to run through the wide open holes. The Navy line, although not as strong as the Gremlins' is always in there fighting hard with Eldon Wenstrom, Hein, Wissel and Jim Considine showing the way. Wenstrom is one of the finest ends in the league. The backfield of the "Middies" is composed of Ray Grund, George Loring, Dick Patelski, and the speedy little Fred Stoesser. This game should provide a great many thrills. The Navy can win the title by taking their next three games.

12:00 NOON - RANGERS VS OWLS: Although the Rangers have not yet won a football game this season, they MUST be pointing for a victory against the Owls on Thanksgiving Day. The Owls, of course, are just as determined to improve their record against the cellar-dwellers on the big day. The Rangers are led by Captain "Fritz" Hebecker, who is a good center or end. George Dreyer and Gene Hartman have also done steady work for the Rangers in the forward wall this year. But the Ranger backfield is not short on talent either. It's about time for Fred Strantz, Ken Cronberg, Chuck Considine, and Bob Baillie to start rolling. Captain Ron Marwitz leads the Owls into this game, trying for another four touchdown win like the one they had on Thanksgiving Day last year. Dick Knortgen, Herb Werner, Ron Schroeder, and "Huddy" Hau are the Owls' best linemen, and Jim Schorn and John Werner have also turned in good jobs at times. With a good line in front of them, the Owls' backs, especially Marwitz and Dick Hoffman, should not have too much trouble on the ground. Owls' passing is capably handled by Marwitz. This should be an interesting game even though the kids feel it is a "setup".

RADIRON NO. 2

1:00 P.M. - WILDCATS VS HAWKS: The opening game on this field finds the Hawks and Wildcats battling for third place in the Frosh Division. In their last meeting, the Wildcats lost third place to the Hawks, and they must win to regain that position for the final standing. Although their running attack has not been very successful this season, Bieman, Lang, Schuenke, and Zientek are always dangerous if their line gives them some support. This has not been true so far. Haag and Kaplan are the only two linemen who have done much up front this season. Their passing is much stronger. With Kaplan chucking aerials to Bieman and Lang, the Wildcats are a constant threat. On the other hand, the Hawks have a fairly strong line led by Cody, Strantz, Pallister, and Both and in their backfield, Jim Taylor and Don Smith have done some fine running. Taylor, besides being one of the hardest driving backs in the Frosh League, is a good passer and an excellent defensive player. Strantz's punting also is better than any kicking the Wildcats have shown. This will be one of the best games of the day.

2:00 P.M. - WARRIORS VS CUBS: In this neighborhood rivalry the championship will be at stake. Last year these same two teams battled it out on Thanksgiving Day with the Cubs taking the honor by a 7 to 6 score. This year the Warriors hope to reverse that decision with their powerful backs of Hansen, Rodgers, Howard and Krumholz carrying the ball through the Cubs' line. The stalwart line of the Cubs consisting of Roy Brown, Don Schoen, Ernie Hemmer and Henry Reitz will try to outcharge the Warrior forward wall of Budig, Fenger, Kittler and Hickey. The backfield of the Cubs has Tony Reibel, Pete Klein, Chuck Gottmann, and the speedy Von Diedrich; these fellie threats at all times and the Warriors know it. The outcome of the game will undoubtedly settle the Prep league championship, and you can bet your last nickel that these two teams will be fighting their wits until the final whistle.

3:00 P.M. - DAGGERS VS WILDCATS: Since the Daggers had no team to play on Thanksgiving Day, the Wildcats volunteered to play twice on Thanksgiving Day. It couldn't be that you wanted two turns at that hot chocolate, could it fellow? Having told you about the Wildcats already, we had better tell you about the Daggers. The Daggers have won or tied only a few games this season, but since the addition of a few new players, they have improved. Soncek, Brink, and Hoskins are the Daggers' backfield standouts; "Andy" Anderson could not play this season because of an injury. Otherwise, the Daggers might have had a much more successful year. Jack Pittges and Joe McGovern are the Daggers' outstanding ends, but the rest of the line does not seem to be any stronger than the Wildcats' forwards. In a recent game between these two teams, the Wildcats tied the Daggers, 6 - 6, on the last play of the game. It should be a close one!

4:00 NOON - TROJANS VS LEATHERNECKS: Although this game will not decide any championship it should be one of the best. The Trojans have a great passing attack which is always a threat, and also give a fine running attack.
