TEAMS EAGER TO REET GRID FOES ON THANKSGIVING DAY

CHAUPIONSHIPS AT STAKE

The 18th annual THANKSGIVING DAY FOOTBALL CLASSICS of the N. B. C. will again be held at Paul Revere Park on Thursday morning. Sixteen games, which is a record high, will be played on the three gridirons, and before the sun rises, there'll be a steady flow of enthusiastic football players arriving at the park to play the first three games of the morning, scheduled to start at 8:00 o'clock. Thereafter every hour on the hour until 1:00 o'clock 6 more teams will take over the field to settle a championship of their league or gain supremacy over a neighborhood rival. As usual a public address system will be used to amounce the starting lineups as well as scores and highlights of the various games. Collège music will blast forth during the quarters and halves, and the National Anthem will be heard before each game. It will be the first time that the new powerful system, which the dads purchased, will be used. Officiating will be handled by N.B.C. Alumni hembers, and the N.B.C. Dads will be on hand again to help with the program wherever needed. Yes, after each game, the Dads will serve all the players with hot chocolate. Be sure to put on your clean clothes after the game before entering the banquet hall for your hot drinks.
