BOYS KEYED UP FOR GRID BATTLES ON THANKSGIVING DAYFIRST KICK-OFFS AT 8:00 A.M.

The 21ST ANNUAL THANKSGIVING DAY FOOTBALL CLASSICS of the N.B.C. will be held at Paul Revere Park on Thursday morning. Fifteen games will be played which means that more than 400 boys will see action on the gridirons. To start the morning off right we have scheduled terrific games for 8:00 o'clock. It should present a startling picture as all these eager football players converge upon the battlefield from all directions to settle major disputes of football supremacy. There's sure to be plenty of fireworks in store for the many spectators as champions are crowned and feuds, arising from neighborhood rivalries, are settled. The games will also mark the wind-up of a banner season in which 244 games were played.



To be in tip-top shape, many of the teams are holding extra practice sessions for the biggest games of the year. Remember last season when the heavy snow put a damper on our schedule for the last three weeks of the season, and then the ankle-deep mud on Thanksgiving? Well, it didn't stop the fight & spirit! So if we don't have perfect weather this year after being very fortunate all season, don't let it stop your team, but play all the harder. Remember, a victory on Thanksgiving Day will make it a season to be remembered regardless of the final team standings.

As usual a public address system will be used to announce the starting lineups as well as the scores and highlights of the various games. College music will be heard during the quarters and halves, and the National Anthem will be played before each game. Officiating will be handled by N.B.C. Alumni Members and Leaders, and the N.B.C. Dads will be on hand to help with the program wherever needed. After each game, the Dads will serve all the players with refreshments in the basement of the clubhouse.

Our motto of the week is "FIGHT TO WIN" and we're sure that the several hundred boys on the gridirons next Thursday will give their "all" for the team they're proud of.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE TO ALL THE PLAYERS: The games on Thursday WILL BE PLAYED whether it snows or rains and no matter how cold it is -- that's traditional at N.B.C. This should be one of the finest athletic events of the year -- everyone has done their share to make it so -- now it's up to all of you to put forth your best efforts in every minute of the game! Every boy should be ready to play at least 1/2 hour before the starting time so the lineups can be announced over the loud speaker system. When the Star Spangled Banner is played before each game you should stand at attention; hold your helmet in your left hand and the other hand should be across your heart. Immediately after the National Anthem is played the whistle over the loud speaker will start the games. Be prepared to play on a muddy gridiron; wear long stockings and gloves if necessary. Wear your football clothes to the park as the locker-rooms will be closed.

GRIDIRON NO. 1

8:00 A.M. - HAWKS VS HORNETS - Seven straight wins and an unscored upon record are what the Hawks want to maintain in the big game on Thursday. The Hornets have fallen twice to Hawk power this season; once in a 7 to 0 game and once by a lopsided 27 to 0 loss. The mainstay of the Hawk team has been Len Ostness, who is a dangerous runner, accurate passer and consistent kicker. Otto Henke and Ken Horner, scat backs, have also contributed to the Hawk cause by consistently ripping off large hunks of ground. They plan on stopping the ground attack of Don Baden and Tom Prohaska and the aerial wizardry of Jim Wiard and Tom Melzl through the use of such proven linemen as Ibsen, Serino and Scoville. The best defense men for the Hornets are Fils, George, Germann and Kryza, who does most of the kicking. Although the Hawks have clinched the championship the Hornets are all fired up and want to upset the Hawk win-streak apple-cart.

GRID RIVALS CLASH ON THURS.!

GRIDIRON NO. 1 CONT'D.

9:00 A.M. - COBRAS VS BRAVES - The Cobras feature a spread formation in their two encounters on Thanksgiving. It will be Ed Bass pitching to Herb Weil. This combination produced many a score throughout the season. Daehler, McArthur and Fabsits will handle the ground attack. The Cobras staunch defense will be led by Schilling, Spittali, Ryan and the Weil brothers. Their encounter with the Braves will be a settlement for second place. The Braves promise a victory over their bigger opponents. They will rely on Al Johnson for most of the wide sweeps while Jerry Meier will attempt to dent the Cobras line. Relth and Kennedy will lead their defense against ground gains while Meier, Johnson, and Anhalt will try to break up the potent Cobra passes. The Braves will try to get another win this Thanksgiving as they did last year when they beat the Blackhawks 7 to 6. This game pits a strong running attack against the fine throwing power of the Cobras. An individual punting duel may develop between Herb Weil and Jerry Meier; they have proven this year, by performance, that they are just about tops in their league. The smaller Braves are aching to even the seasons score with the Cobras. Thursday will tell the tale.

10:00 A.M. - BLACKHAWKS VS MAROONS - The Blackhawks will attempt to make up for a defeat handed them by these same Maroons earlier in the season which marked their first loss. The Blackhawks will be led by Dan Paluch who will do the kicking and haul down some Brandt passes. Barker and Duignan will be counted on to lead the Blackhawks on the ground. On defense Diebold, Wolfert, K. Brandt and Paluch can be counted on to cut down Maroon backs. The Maroons will try to do what no other team was able to do, conquer the Blackhawks twice. Knapp and Logan will lead the Maroons on toward victory with their runs and Montgomery will fling some passes, usually to Edwards. Montgomery, Edwards and Kuechenberg will head the sparkling Maroon defense. The Maroons predict a 14 to 0 victory. They are out to prove their superiority over the first place Blackhawks.

11:00 A.M. - SPARKS VS CUBS - This game won't mean anything in the standings, for the Sparks have already won the championship, but there certainly is a lot of prestige at stake. In their only meeting this season they played to a hard-fought tie. The Sparks have been unscored upon in two years which testifies to the ability of defense-men, "Moose" Carlson, "Bulldog" Vormittag, Dick Geib and Bernie Ford. Backing up their top defense, the Sparks have a fine assortment of backfield dependables. They are Jim Barr, Ron Julian, George Auer, Larry Hanke and Don Dickover. Dickover is one of the best backs in the league. Don has also pitched to Ed Thorholm and Geib which has often thrown the opposition off balance. The Cubs have four steady runners in Ron Arens, Larry Fitzpatrick, Mike Lung and Rubin. Fitzpatrick has also connected very well this season on passes to his end Putzback and Rubin. In Tom O'Connor the Cubs possess one of the top defensive linemen in the whole club and with the other linemen intends on stopping the formidable running attack as they did earlier in the season, and who knows, they might do it. O'Connor, Ford and Dickover do most of the kicking for these teams, and very well too. The Sparks don't intend to have their string of victories broken, but the Cubs are sure they can. 12:00 NGON - LEOPARDS VS JETS - Although the Leopards have had a poor season, they hope to give the Jets a run for their money. The underdog Leopards have shown up very well for football and aim to grab their first win on Thanksgiving. The Jets are confident though, and are sure of piling up a heavy score. Passing is the Jets main offensive weapon with Don Elkin pitching very well to one of the backs or ends. When there are only a few yards to go either Elkin, Grelok, Baumhart or Composto are given the assignment, and usually make it. Klein, Spahr, Imburgia and Pfeiffer handle the running tasks and Pfeiffer and Fitzpatrick are the boys with the strong arms when it comes to passing. Both teams have defensive standouts. They are Ed Meyer and Don Bluemel; incidentally, these two boys also handle most of the kicking. The Jets feel they would have taken the championship if their attendance had been better so they're going to have everybody up for this one. The Leopards plan on disproving this theory. There may be an upset in the making.

8:00 A.M. - JOKERS VS SPIDERS - The Jokers clash with the Spiders in a fracas on Thanksgiving Day that promises to be a corker. The Jokers devastating attack will be led by Di John and Halfman. Although predominantly a running team Di John occasionally lets fly with an aerial. Their defense will be led by such stalwarts as Abraham, Harrison and Timm. Harrison and Miller will share the kicking chores. The Spiders are planning surprise for the Jokers. Grelok, Borek and Stone will carry the brunt of the offensive, while Bosshart, Reiner, Bartlett and Schray will lead a hard-charging defensive team. Dave Schray has the ability to toe the pigskin out of trouble but the Spiders promise he'll not have too much work Thursday. Joe Reiner is the passing wizard and his ends Bosshart and Bartlett promise to haul some down. This is a neighborhood rivalry that should really produce some thrills!

9:00 A.M. - NORTHERNS VS SCORPIONS - The Northerns say they are out to run up a big score against the underdog Scorpions. They say Tom Beck will have no trouble running through would-be Scorpion defensemen. "Tiger" Lyon, Feltis and Hoffman will be counted on to crush Scorpion backs. The Northerns feature an aerial barrage with Tom Beck usually heaving to Lyon who really has sticky fingers and is one of the best receivers in the entire N.B.C. If their attack is stymied by the Scorpions Ray Feltes will boot the ball. The Scorpions are eyeing a big upset in this contest; Adams and Hagstrom will try to cross the white stripe for many scores. The Scorpions passing attack will be mainly Best to Cluever or Ray Ruth. Cluever and Cozza will do the kicking for the Scorpions and the Northerns promise them a lot of action Thursday. Bill Fischer and Ron Anderson will lead the ground game while Flemming will flip some long passes to O'Meyer and Ahern. O'Meyer and Simoncelli will try to stop the Cobra rushes and Anderson and Flemming will try to stop the heaves of Ed Bass. The Diamonds will be gunning for this one and should make it a good contest. Though Anderson and Fischer do most of the ground-gaining Kuehn and Walsh also are dangerous especially if they get loose even for a short time. The Cobras will expect a lot from Bob Daehler and Benjamin because they have borne the brunt of the running all year. Revenge is another motive for the Cobra eleven. They still are burned up because the Diamonds took the baseball championship right from under their noses. Both teams, neighborhood rivals, will try to retain their victory string on Thanksgiving; they each won last year, but only one will be able to say that after Thursday unless there is a tie.

12:00 NOON - COMMANCHES VS ACES: - Can the Aces upset the Commanches again? They think so! Early in the season the Commanches humiliated them four straight times but the fifth time, boom, the last place Aces clobbered them. An added incentive for the underdogs is that a win over the top team in the league may topple them from their lofty position. The Commanches in their second game of the day are confident that the loss to the Aces was only a freak and they'll prove it by winning easily. Along with Reinhart they have Dennis Crow, Bob Schmidt and Schurer who have ably assisted Skip all year. But the Aces have counters in Oliva and Willenius who have shown some fancy broken-field running along with hard-plunging Hoffman and Haering who have been consistent ground gainers. Lefty Ed Haering, a pint-sized Frankie Albert, will attempt to hit Thinnes and Harris with passes; "triple threat" Ed also does the kicking and punting.

GRIDIRON NO. 3

8:00 A.M. - TIGERS VS KINGS - The Tigers think the Kings will not give much opposition to the rambling of O'Connor and Bob Richards but the Kings have another idea. They think Zingsheim, Hundrieser, the Ryan brothers and Ackerman will be able to stop them. The Tigers will depend on Litteken, Richards and Casey to stop the onslaughts of Combiths, the Kings versatile quarterback, and Ackerman. Combiths will pitch occasionally for the Kings but neither team is noted for an outstanding aerial attack. Combiths will "toe" the ball for the Kings while Tom Richards will do the Tigers kicking. The two teams will experience the excitement of the Classic for the first time. The Kings have a double purpose for seeking a win on Thursday. First, they want to even the season series; they are one game down, and also there is a possibility that they may move up in the standings if they are victorious. Their top line-men are Koupish, Schwendau and Lueller and they'll attempt to stop the runs of Dave Schilling and Bruce Bradley of the Eagles. The Eagle kicking will be done by Joel Weber who also is a bulwark on defense. He will be aided by the Schwager brothers and Jim Clarke. The Eagles will be out to show their victory over the Spiders was no fluke, and that they will be able to beat their arch-rivals, the Centipedes for the first time this year. The Centipedes are going to have something to say about it though and we expect a terrific game.

10:00 A.M. - MARINES VS APACHES - The Marines will be striving to attain a tie in this battle for the Baby League Championship - of course the Tigers must aid the Marines on Tuesday with a victory over the Apaches. The Marines will depend on Stewart Citron to carry them to victory. Citron will do most of the kicking, passing and running and he will be aided by the "Twins" in the ground attack. The Marines defensive wall will be led by Antos, Nelson and the Hansen brothers. Billy Peters will play on pass defense. They are attempting to gain their first victory over the Apaches. The Apaches will be trying to cinch the championship. This game should be an almost individual encounter with "Heavey vs Citron." Jimmy will do the running for the Apaches and this little kid really can "pick 'em up and lay 'em down". McDade and Reinhart will lend a helping hand in the ball carrying chores.
