THE ANNUAL THANKSGIVING DAY FOOTBALL CLASSICS of the N.B.C. will again be held at Paul Revere Park on Thursday morning. Seventeen games will be played on the three days before the sun rises there'll be a steady stream of enthusiastic spectators at the park to play the first games of the morning. An abundance of snow and freezing weather have deeply cut into the regular schedule of games during the past three weeks. Thanksgiving however is N.B.C.
