8:00 A.M. - COPPERHEADS VS CORSAIRS ON CRIDIRON NO. 1

If things continue as they have been going in the Junior League, this game should decide the Championship. The Copperheads will be starting from every formation they know in an effort to outscore the Corsairs. Genovaldi and Don Swanson will be called on for the line plunges and Anderson and Pinello will try the end sweeps. The Corsairs will use Brandenburger up the middle and Murphy will be the big throat on and runs. Murphy, Lucohesi, Sohmalbach and Brandenburger will operate from the slot formation, the "T" and the single wing. Either Murphy or Lucohesi will be called on to pass and their favorite targets will be Boring and Kwech. Don Swanson and Scott are the passing threats of the Copperheads and Anderson or Hennesy are their choice receivers. Anderson, Scott, Hennesy, Spitalli and Herb Swanson will belster their teams defensive lineup, while the Corsairs will be counting on Sovsky, Lasoh, Zanotti and Vertucci. Kwech will be called on by his team to handle all of the kicking chores. It is very possible that his accurate toe will be used in field goal attempts. CARDINALS VS FALCONS - GRIDIRON NO. 1 Even though neither team is in the running, this game should be one of the best cattles of the day. The Falcons handed the Dragons their only defeat of the year and the Cardinals really surprised the Warriors last week by trimming them 12 to 0. So anything can happen in this game.
