TRIBUTE TO THE LATE PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY

The death of President Kennedy is not the death of one man. It is not the loss of him as an individual, or as someone holding the office of President. It is, in a way, the death of part of every man in this nation. We, the people, chose him to represent us in all governmental decisions. It is therefore, that part of each individual that he stood for, that was assassinated.

An analogy of his life would be senseless as it is known so well. He was the youngest president on record. With his death, moreover the manner of his death, died that youth. At the height of his career, and his country's need for him, he was cut down uselessly by a sniper's bullet.

Assassination of the President seems unheard of in a modern world. It seems outdated, and made impossible by the errors of the past and the caution of the present. Assassination is especially ironic in a country where any man can express his views freely; where one may disagree openly with the President. Why must murder be resorted to?

As least I feel sure of one thing: Kennedy was a truly great President. His assassination itself gives tribute to this. For if he were not a great man, doing a monumental job, it would not have been necessary for extremists to kill him.

Never before has a President been so widely accepted as a universal concept of "An American". His family life linked him so closely to the American people. His interests in our sports, and participation in them made him "one of us". It might also be pointed out that he fought, voluntarily, in the last war. He didn't have to do this. Nor, for that matter, did financial difficulties, honor, or position impel him to assume, or even lure him to the Presidency. He already had the esteem of a Senator, and was obviously in good financial standing. This left as his only motivation to the presidency, the prospects of HELPING HIS COUNTRY:

And this he did. His Peace Corps remains the most effective force yet in existence, against communism. His unprecedented handling of the Berlin situation can hardly be ignored. The assured manner and effectiveness with which he handled the Cuban crises was a monumental task which few leaders could have duplicated. This indeed turned the entire course of American handling of Russia. The well timed power he exerted over industry during the steel strike; his stand on civil rights over the University of Mississippi, all of these mark the progress and efforts of a truly great man. In my opinion the last such man was Abraham Lincoln. If this is true, then what is the price of greatness?

November 22nd stands black indeed to us - as individuals, as a nation, and as a world. For the loss to mankind of John F. Kennedy is, as Lincoln once said, "far beyond our poor power to add, or detract."

THANKSGIVING DAY GAMES CLIMAX GRID SEASON

The Neighborhood Boys Club's 33rd annual THANKSGIVING DAY FOOTBALL CLASSICS will be held at Paul Revere Park on Thursday morning. More than 400 boys will see action on the three gridirons with three games every hour on the hour starting at 8:00 A.M. and continuing through noon.

In three of the leagues the top games of the morning will most likely decide the championship. As early as 8:00 A.M. the Hornets and Wasps in the Tribe League will play the decisive game just like they did last year when the Wasps beat them to take the title. Among the older boys in the Team League, the Buccaneers-Panthers and Wasps-Bumblebees will be most important to decide the winners. In another league the Jaguars will play the Bobcats in what may decide the championship. Last year on Thanksgiving Day the Jaguars beat the Bobcats 25 to 7 in a big upset. Also at 11:00 there'll be another very interesting game between the Bluejays, last year's champs and the Pirates who have already clinched the title. All the games however will be very interesting and exciting as all the boys in colorful uniforms will be giving their all on the three gridirons. 8:00 A.M. - WASPS VS HORNETS ON GRIDIRON NO. 1 - One year ago these same two teams met on Thanksgiving Day to decide the Championship in Team Center 5. The Wasps came out on top in that game, but the Hornets will undoubtedly be trying to even the score as once again this game will probably mean the crown. The two teams split their games this year. The Wasps won the first by the score of 12 to 6 and the Hornets the second 8 to 0. The Wasps run out of the single wing and T formations, while the Hornets mainly employ the single wing. The Wasps have three excellent backs in Hans Kief, Bob Fahey, and Pat Dwyer who are able to break loose at almost any time. The Hornets do not have the same backfield strength, but Bob Becker does a fine job of moving their offense. In the passing department the Hornets definitely have the edge on the Wasps. George Skinner does most of the passing to Pat Pfeiffer and George Bicknell, while the Wasps will throw mainly to Larry Fett and Paul Brendel. The Wasps are led on defense by Dick "Jumbo" Caudell, Tom Radovonovich, Bruce Shobutte, and Larry Goessling, who have been very stingy in giving up points. The Hornets will counter with John O'Donnell, Joe Mc Mahon, and Tom "T-bone" Bicknell. In order to win the Wasps must stop the Hornet's passing attack, while the Hornets will have to contain the Wasps outstanding running game. You can be sure that Mr. Skinner and Mr. Fett, the coaches of the Hornets and Wasps, will have something special cooked up for this important game. This will be one of the best games of the day and to predict a winner would be an almost impossible job.

8:00 A.M. - SPIDERS VS LEOPARDS ON GRIDIRON NO. 2 - Although the Spiders are at the bottom of the heap in the Team Center 5 race, the Leopards from Team Center 4 will have their hands full on "Turkey Day". The Leopards are storming back after getting off to a slow start and a victory would put the finishing touches on their season. The Spiders operate from the single wing offense with Ed Donahue carrying up the middle and Tom Duffy around the ends, while the Leopards who run from the straight T, will counter with Frank "Speedy" Tierhold and Billy Gilger. When the ground games bog down you can expect to see both teams take to the air. For the Spiders Mike Congoran will be aiming for Mike Mc Namara and Jim Reid, both of whom are fine receivers, and for the Leopards Pat Duckhorn will be doing the pitching to Rich and Ron Moyers. On the defense the Spiders have Bob Hertel, Steve Duffy, and Mike Wilhelm up front and Mike Mc Namara roaming around as saftey man. The Leopards on the other hand have Pat Duckhorn, Joe Petrusaitas, Mike Lesser, and Gerald Miller in the front line to thwart the Spiders attack. Since both teams are relative strangers to each other, this should be one of the most interesting games of the day.

8:00 A.M. - HORNETS & SCORPIONS VS SPIDERS ON GRIDIRON NO. 3 - These two teams will clash in a good, old-fashioned, rough, tough football game on Thanksgiving Day. The Hornets and Scorpions will join forces in attempting to gain a victory, however they will have a hard time in overcoming the Spiders. The Spiders have a good offense and an average defense. Their line consists of Russ Cusimano, Tom Lunkes, Bob Klauk, and Jim Donahue, who are all very large. Their backfield is led by Spencer Reid, who is a very elusive runner. The Hornets have an excellent defense, which consists of John Mc Hugh, Gerrie Haslwanter, Sam Lazzara, Phil Immel, and the Abplanalp brothers, Tom and Bill. Their backfield has three explosive runners in Tim Mc Guire, Ray Blumenthal, and Tom Mc Donough. The Scorpions, who will reinforce the Hornets, have a powerful offense, with a line led by Bob Kartheiser, Pat Greene, and Cris Nogulich. Vince Pernice and Guy Hellstrom are their two running backs. The fur will really fly in this game as both teams will be playing for the first time on Thanksgiving Day.

9:00 A.M. - CENTIPEDES VS BEES ON GRIDIRON NO. 1 - In a game involving two teams well down in the Team Center 5 standings, the Bees meet the Centipedes. Both teams have yet to show much on offense although the Bees have one upset victory to their credit, a 7 to 0 victory over the Scorpions. The Bees are anchored by the Ackerman brothers, Guy and Al, and Ron Malnati. Quarterback Guy is a fine runner, surely in contention for N.B.C. All-American honors. He, along with Malnati, is quick and dangerous when given a little room. Guy's 60 yard run recently gave the Bees a 6 to 0 victory over the Spiders while Ron's 65 yard T.D. jaunt made the Hornets come from behind in the waning seconds for the win. Al Ackerman, a fine defensive lineman, makes many of the Bees' tackles. The Centipedes are having a disappointing year. The backfield led by Don Jost and John Fugii has had very little success. When the Centipedes throw, John Meier is usually on the receiving end. Marty Bak and John Kaufmann provide the strength up front in the line. On defense, Bak and Meier lead the charges, while in the secondary Jost is a deadly tackler. This game is a tossup and if either team is able to muster a good attack, that team should come out on top. You can be sure that even though this game will not have a bearing on the standings both teams will be giving their all to try and win it.



9:00 - BUMBLEBEES VS WASPS ON GRIDIRON NO. 2 - The Championship in the Team League is still up for grabs. Both the Bumblebees and the Wasps along with the Buccs are in the thick of the fight. Ralph Miller's Bumblebees have met Tom Coppola's Wasps only once before with the game ending in a 0 to 0 tie. The Bumblebees are led by Den Malnati who directs the team from their split T formation. They excel at the dive series with Malnati, George Ribbon, and Jim Paschell carrying. They also have a fine passing attack with Malnati and Rich Boywid throwing to Art Lartz who has scored seven touchdowns this year. The Wasps will be moving the ball from the unique I formation and the short punt. They have been seriously handicapped by the loss of their fine quarterback, Dave Fahey, who was injured midway through the season. The Wasps will be depending heavily upon the running of Billy Schneider and Russ Gebhardt. When they shift to the short punt, Dick Woodburn will usually be back to pass. He has two exceptionally good receivers in Don Bushnell and Doug Schroeder. Both defenses have been very strong, but the Wasps, who have only given up six points all year, seem to have the edge. The Wasps defense consists of Jim Krause, John Vogel, Tim Ryan, Jim Guleserian, and Werner Kief, while the Bumblebees have Nick Kaufmann, Leon Olzeski, Greg La Papa, Jim Schodtler, and Bob Cole on their unit. Jim Schodtler and Bob Cole have each intercepted five passes this season. John Vogel and Tim Ryan will handle the kicking for the Wasps, while Bill Kasten, Scott Boever, and Greg La Papa share this chore for the Bumblebees. Jim Greene, Don Banks, Val Kashiell, Mark Niemand, and Mario Sparacino of the Bumblebees and Jim Haslwanter and Ricky Meck of the Wasps have also proved invaluable to their teams as they have filled various positions. This is a very important game for both of these teams.

9:00 A.M. - WASPS VS BOBCATS & LEOPARDS & POLECATS ON GRIDIRON NO. 3 - The Bobcats are going to combine with the Leopards and Polecats on Thanksgiving Day to see what they can do about the high-flying Wasps. The Wasps have won their first six games in a row and have a well balanced team, which shows up in the fact that 11 of their 19 players have scored points. The Wasps defense has been tremendous, they have allowed only 6 pts. all year and that came on a 50 yard run by Spencer Reid of the Spiders. The Wasps have a terrific pride in their team; so much so that they are one of two Pup League teams to be playing as a single unit, not combined with another team. They have 19 boys on their roster and have never had less than 16 at a game. The Wasps will find on Thanksgiving that they are up against their strongest opponent of the year. The combined record of the Bobcats, Leopards, and Polecatd is 8 wins and only 2 losses. For the Bobcats, backs Bob Zuponeck and Randy Schneider will be testing the Wasps strong defensive line consisting of Glenn Stahl, Edwin Reichardt, and Mike Newell. The Wasps will counter with halfbacks Jeffrey Kovacs, Frank Patryn, and Mike Nakashion. The Bobcats have some fine tackles in Keith Donovan and Steve Borgert. Ralph Stahl has been doing a fine job of coaching the Wasps, and will certainly have his team ready for the big game as he has all season.

10:00 A.M. - SCORPIONS VS DRAGONS ON GRIDIRON NO. 1 - Quarterbacks Tom Couch of the Scorpions and Kevin Mc Guire of the Dragons meet head on with their similar attacks on Thanksgiving in what should be a very close contest. The Scorpions depend mainly on the ability of Tom Couch, who calls the signals, runs, and passes very well. Vince Incandella is Couch's favorite target on the down and out pattern as John Kosick and Fred Grief provide protection up front. Gene Sieburg and Ed Blumel are the running backs and also do a good job. The Scorps are still in the running for the Team Center 5 crown. Despite their unexpected loss to the Bees, one defeat of the Wasps and Hornets opens the door for them. The Dragons are the upset kings. A 12 to 0 victory over the first place Wasps and a 6 to 6 tie with the Hornets show the ability of this squad. Kevin Mc Guire's two long runs against the Wasps accounted for the scores. Mc Guire and Don Illing have teamed up several times this year for long scoring passes. Mc Guire is hard to bring down, and if he gets around the corner, is gone. Illing is the defensive standout, making many tackles and breaking up passes at the same time. Good luck to both teams in this important game.

10:00 A.M. - BUCCS VS PANTHERS ON GRIDIRON NO. 2 - This is the other game in the Team League which very possibly could decide the Championship. The Buccs need to win this game, while the Panther's have a nothing to lose attitude which might aid them in shaking up the top-runners. The Buccs run from the split wing and very often will call a heavy back to pass. Frank Peters, coach of the Panthers, believes that variety is the spice of life and will employ the straight T, short punt, shot gun, and also an occasional heavy back. Neither the Panthers nor the Buccs have been able to move the ball consistently on the ground and therefore must rely heavily on their passing attacks. Ricky West does most of the ball carrying for the Panthers, while Gene Schmidt and Vic Lombardo spear head the Buccs. For the Buccs Rich Fabry does most of the passing to Ray Fox and Nick Cutinello. Fox is by far

the most ablest receiver in the Team League. For the Panthers Don Hamor will be doing the tossing to Ray Kramer and Paul Culp who are both good receivers. The defenses are adequate, but are not the best in the league. The Panthers defense is made up of Ernie Lazar, Bill Sarb, Steve Wright, Bruce Porsche, and Terry Schmidt in the line and Randy Pelligrini, Don Clausen, and Brian Oshita in the backfield. The Buccs have Ray Fox, Wayne Beutin, Al Felds, and Les Bowers up front on their defensive unit. This game will probably be decided through the air since neither team possesses a strong ground game. In their other previous meeting the game ended in a 12 to 12 tie. On past performances the Buccs must be made a favorite, but when two teams of this caliber meet, watch out anything can happen.

10:00 A.M. - FALCONS & HAWKS & EAGLES VS CARDINALS & RAVENS & BLUEJAYS ON GRIDIRON

NO. 3 - The final Pup League game on Thanksgiving Day will be a clash between the Falcons and the Cardinals. The Falcons will be led in their attack by Rich Steirmetz who runs well around the ends, and Mike Norbert who runs up the middle. The Falcons line is made up of Steve Adams, Mike Traba, Steve Viskiys, Robert Lowe, and Tom Jennings. The Cards will have to have an alert defense to stop the Falcons fine running attack. For the Cards, Bob Sorenson leads the way with his fine running around the ends as well as through the middle. Steve Wild and John Hulbert will also carry the ball through the middle for the Cards. Tony and Vic Rivas will lead the Cards defense in their attempt to block the Falcons. Each team has only won one game so look for this game to be one in which both teams will be going all out to win.

11:00 A.M. - BLUEJAYS VS PIRATES ON GRIDIRON NO. 1

- In the game pitting the Tribe League's best drilled team against one of the league's best runners, the Pirates hope to continue their domination of the Bluejays. Mr. Herb Veith has again drilled a group of boys (it was the Navy two years ago) into the best looking team in the whole Tribe League. Steve Veith directs the attack very ably with speedy backs John Gruber and Bud Miller and big end Boivin ready for a handoff or a pass. The Pirates have a 3 -0 record against the challenging Bluejays, but anything is possible on Thanksgiving Day. The Bluejays, meanwhile, hope to spring their ace back Rich Chernikovich free for several scores. Rich has scored over 20 T.D.'s this year, four of which are in excess of 60 yards. The Jay's forward wall is not as strong as the Pirate's, but the running of Chernikovich and Bob Nagy makes up for that deficit. The Bluejays remember last year when a safety won for them a 2 to 0 victory and the Championship and are out to prove that they are the best. This should be one of the best games of the day.

11:00 A.M. - BOBCATS VS JAGUARS ON GRIDIRON NO. 2

- This game will undoubtedly decide the Team Center 4 champion and is being prepared for by both teams. Both teams possess fine runners with Bruce Stake of the Bobcats and George "Skeeter" James of the Jaguars. The Jaguars have been hurt four times this year by short lineups, which almost cost them the title. The acquisition of a coach by the Bobcats has helped them to rise to their first place status and they will fight to retain it. Bruce Stake, their powerful flash, leads the attack. Gary Kaberline and Ricky Davis are also Bobcat standouts. The Jaguars counter with George James and Ray Bond. They were hurt in the backfield earlier this year by the loss of Tom Weininger through an appendicitis attack. Tom had kicked 10 of 13 extra points before he was forced to stop playing. Alan Clark and Gary Oshita are two fine forwards on offense and deadly tacklers on defense. May the best team win.

11:00 A.M. - RAVENS VS FALCONS ON GRIDIRON NO. 3

- The lower two teams in Team Center 1 meet on gridiron 3 at 11:00 and a Raven victory may still gain them a second place finish. After a fast start, the Ravens have cooled off and have had trouble recently in getting an offense moving. With the frequent absence of speedy Joe Colletti, the Ravens have steadily dipped. The Anzalone brothers, Dale and Joe, and Larry Krenos are the big lineman for the blackbirds and hope to lead their team to a second place finish through their outstanding defensive play. The Falcons however, are a tough team to beat. The only team to beat the Pirates, the Falcons have otherwise had only mediocre success. Dennis Sharkey and Jimmy Rey are both good runners. Big Bob Nelson is a glue-fingered end who also is a fine blocker and a deadly tackler. This should be a game primarily of good defenses with occasional lengthy sprints by Colletti and Sharkey.
