The 34th annual Thanksgiving Day Football Classics of the Neighborhood Boys Club will be held at Paul Revere Park on Thursday, November 26th. At this writing the fields are entirely covered with snow but THE GAMES WILL BE PLAYED AS SCHEDULED. Kick-offs for the first three games will be at 8:00 A.M. sharp and thereafter 3 games will be played every hour on the hour thru noon.

At 11:00 A.M. the new flag pole which the Alumni donated to the Club will be dedicated. It was presented to the Club as a memorial to the twenty former N.B.C. members who made the supreme sacrifice for their country.

On these same gridirons over those many years N.B.C. has played about 6,000 games, and that in itself is quite a record. On Thanksgiving Day there have always been championships decided, big upsets, team efforts in goal line stands and all types of heroic play, and dismal records forgotten in that one big quest for a VICTORY on the final day. Approximately 450 boys will see action on the three gridirons. Cheerleaders have been practicing very hard for the big event and they'll be out about "50 strong" to lead the cheering at every game.

On Wednesday evening, November 25th, a Noisy Pep Rally will be held to kick-off the Football Classics. All Americans in each of the Tribe leagues, voted for by player opponents, officials and coaches will be announced. Certificates of Merit will be awarded to each boy mentioned as a remembrance. Cheerleaders will lead all the rah, rahs; captains will make predictions on the outcome of the games and the dads club will award a few footballs to the boys who display the best Grid Classic posters. The rally will be in the clubhouse and will start at 7:30 P.M.

As in the past the Alumni will handle the officiating and the Dads Club will serve hot chocolate, coffee and cake to all the players and parents after each game.

Remind your parents about the convenient spot for parking. Victor-Comptometer Corp. has made their parking lot available for all of your folks who'll be driving to the Club. Cars may enter at Campbell and Byron.

**IMPORTANT:** Be sure to be in the clubhouse at least 1/2 hour before the starting time of your game. The Clubhouse will be open at 7:00 A.M. Each team will have a separate dressing room in the clubhouse and all boys should use the east entrance. If the fields are frozen you'll be permitted to wear gloves. SEE YOU THURSDAY MORNING!

The details of every game follow:

3:00 A. M. - DRAGONS VS BEES ON GRIDIRON NO. 1 - This game could well determine the championship in the White Division. The Bees run out of a split T-formation with Dan Miller calling the plays. The speed of the team centers around Ron Malnati and Steve Hellstrom. Their passing attack sees Dan Miller hitting Al Ackermann, Bob Kaiser and Ken Cole. In the kicking department, Bob Kaiser handles the punting while Guy Ackermann kicks for the PAT's. They have a strong line both on offense and on defense and the stalwarts are John Reininger, Mike Miller, Ken Cole and Jim Rottman. The Dragons use a T-formation with Kevin McGuire and Larry Sullivan carrying the ball. Kev McGuire passes to Rich Murray and Don Illing with consistency and has plenty of time behind the strong line of Tom Fryer, Kevin Richards and Scott Love. When it comes to defense, it's just the opposite as they never give anyone time to pass as Tom Agosti, Tony Giavenco and Mike McGuire charge in on the passer. Don Illing does the booting both on punts and kick-offs.

8:00 A. M. - WASPS VS HAWKS ON GRIDIRON NO. 2 - This game between the Wasps and Hawks will be a battle for first place. Leading the Wasps will be Jeff Kovacs, who does the kicking, the outstanding runner and the leading scorer. Ed Myers, Glen Stahl and Tim Fahey will be the targets of Kovacs' passes. Working out of a double winged T formation, linemen Ray Moeller, Jack Freeman, Ed and John Reichardt, Jim and Mike Barrett, Don Dietz and Bruce Martin will do the blocking for Kovacs, Jim Vogel and Tim Fahey. They plan to attack the Hawks with plenty of end runs, their most effective type of play throughout the season. Coach Ralph Stahl says "We know that we can beat these guys because we have good team work, good spirit and everyone is going to work harder because the Hawks are a darn good team." For the Hawks, Steve Yonk is a real power runner. They also have a couple of boys who are real shifty in the open field, Jim Simpson and Pete Ziegler. The backfield of Yonk, Simpson and Ziegler will be aided by the blocking of Allen Witta, Russ Adam, Tom Iverson, Earl Waterman, Rich Randall and George Valentine. Allen Witta will do both the punting and place kicking. The Hawks feel that they will win because they have a lot of spirit and their coaching staff of Bill Yonk, George Valentine, Gene Norman and Bill Norberg have given them enough practice to beat anyone.

8:00 A. M. - HORNETS VS BOBCATS ON GRIDIRON NO. 3 - The Hornets, who are trying to even up their record of 5-6-1 are led by the running of 4 speedy backs, Ray Blumenthal, Chuck Becker, Tom Abplanalp and Ron Meck. The Hornets will be depending especially on the running of Ray Blumenthal whose many long runs have been responsible for several of their victories. When they go to a passing game, Blumenthal or Chuck Becker usually pitch the ball to Bill Abplanalp or Tom Doloughty. The Hornets run from a T or a single wing formation and have been most effective when running the ends. Both the kick-offs and the punting assignments are handled by Bill Abplanalp. The Hornets have many tough linemen in Gerrie Haslwanter, Mark Maas, Jeff Lazzara, Bill Abplanalp, Tom Doloughty and Lee Jennings. The Bobcats are led by their triple threat quarterback, Keith Donavan. They operate out of a short punt formation with Donavan at tailback and Don Johnson and Steve Shadal, who are also good runners, at the halfbacks. When Donavan passes he usually looks for Andy Johnson. The Bobcats, like the Hornets, have the most success on the end sweeps. On the line, the Bobcats are led by center Frank Volante along with Steve Borgert, Mike Colletta, Don Neuman, Andy Johnson, Randy Schneider and Greg Bigalow. This should be a real close game and running contest between Blumenthal and Donavan should provide a great deal of interest.

9:00 A. M. - BLUEJAYS VS RAVENS ON GRIDIRON NO. 1 - The Bluejays and Ravens are preparing for their clash on Thanksgiving Day and the winner will capture third place in the White Division. The Ravens, who own the 3rd place spot at the moment, depend mostly on the brilliant running of Joe Colletti and Frank Lambert. With a forward wall of Joe and Dale Anzalone, Greg Lawton and Ron Balat, the Ravens really make the power plays click. They like to play out of the T formation and when they elect to pass, Dale Anzalone comes to the backfield and fires for Larry Krenas or Bob Wess. One unusual thing about the Ravens is that they have an excellent drop kicker in Larry Krenas, who has scored many 2 point kicks during the season.

BLUEJAYS VS RAVENS (continued) - The Bluejays have an excellent team this year with a backfield of John Gruber, Rich Chernikovich, Gary Paceszny and Bob Nagy, all of whom can throw or run well. They prefer to use tricky plays rather than to play a power type of game. One of their favorite trickers is a double reverse. The Bluejays offense is run from a double wing formation and they have a good offensive line with Rich Schultz, Mike Kozlik, Ray Duke and John Gerren forming excellent protection for the backfield. Their defensive men make it tough for the opposition and they include Jim Cwik, Mike Dempsey, Ron Novak and Craig DeCaluwe. This group is always putting the pressure on opposing backs. Rich Chernikovich is their star passer and he specializes in short passes to Jerry Henly and Gary Paceszney. Coaches Ron Jankoski and Louis Nagy have done an excellent job with the Bluejays. A close game is expected between these two teams and it is quite likely that the team which plays the best defensive game will come out on top.

9:00 A. M. - COUGARS VS SPIDERS ON GRIDIRON NO. 2 - The Spiders will duel the Cougars in an inter-division contest. The Spiders run from the T-formation and Mike McNamara calls the plays. They have speedy runners in Scott Gordon and Randy Ruther. In the passing department, Mike Congoran usually finds Mike McNamara or Jim Reid in the open. Congoran, T. Lapi, John Itter and Tony Camisa make up the Spider forward wall. Congoran handles the punting and place kicking chores. The Cougars use a split T formation and like to throw quick passes to the flanker back. Larry Bergner calls the plays for the Cougars and does the running through the line while Bob Sokolowski excels at end runs. Linemen on the Cougar team include Jerry Peebles, Tom Maska, Bob Quartell and John Summerville. Bob Sokolowski does the punting and also handles the place kicking assignments.

9:00 A. M. - SCORPIONS VS SPIDERS ON GRIDIRON NO. 3 - In a battle of the two bottom teams of the Pup League, the Scorpions will be fighting it out with the Spiders. The Scorpions, who run from a T-formation or a short punt, are led by the running of Vince Pernice, Ray Kaminski and quarterback Tom Schmidt. Schmidt does most of the passing with Pat Greene being his favorite target. Triple threat man Schmidt also takes care of the punting when it becomes necessary. The stalwarts on the line have been Bob Kartheiser, Joe Imburgia, Bill Gumler, Neal Farella and Pat Greene. At kick off time, Greene puts his toe to work. The Scorpions are now coached by Jim Paschal and will be going for their 5th win against 9 losses and a tie. The Spiders run from a single wing and they are still looking for their first victory of the season. You can bet that they'll be giving it their best in this their final game of the season. The Spiders have 2 shifty runners in Jim Donahue and Spencer Reid while Ed Feuling does well on power plays. When passing, the Spiders call Russ Cusimano back from the line to throw to Dan Casey or Paul Gebhardt. On the line Russ Cusimano, Paul Gebhardt, John McNicholas and Dan Casey have proven to be rough to run through. This should prove to be one of the better games of the morning with the Spiders really giving their all for a victory.

10:00 A. M. - HORNETS VS TARANTULAS ON GRIDIRON NO. 1 - The Hornets have been practicing very hard lately and they really want to win this game. Certainly, the Hornets will have a great advantage since they possess outstanding runners in Bob Becker and George Skinner and with the distinct possibility of cold weather the passing attacks will be slowed down. Should the Hornets go to the air, Skinner will do the throwing and Pat Pfeiffer and George Bicknell will be on the receiving end. The Hornets operate from a T formation and are quite effective with quick openers as well as tricky reverses. George Bicknell takes care of the place kicking and Skinner handles the punting. The offensive linemen include John O'Donnell, Marty McHugh, and Frank Haslwanter. On the defensive line they have Dave Maas, Joe Mc Mahon, Tom Bicknell and Bob Schlitter. Others who have helped their team are Mike Neilon, Dave Chekel, Joe Greco, Joe Koller, Dave Lukaszewski and Tom Seablom. The Hornets are coached by Mr. Becker and Mr. Bicknell. The Tarantulas small backfield usually depends on the work of quarterback Greg Schnoebelen, who is also outstanding on defense. Other backfield men are Jay Schmidt, Dan Tueffel and Tom Coone. Tony Castiglioni and Bill Wurglitz do the passing. Both are ends along with Mike Tueffel. Since their running attack is weak, the Tarantulas will be hard put to gain yardage, especially if they run into cold weather. Nick Krismer does the kicking off and Bill Wurglitz takes care of the punting. Their offensive line is made up of Nick Krismer, Bob Page, Dan Wahl, Ken Mazzeffi, and Bill Wurglitz. They also have Mike Krismer, Rich Paschall, Tom Ehrmann and Dan Szewczyk on defense along with Castiglioni, Wurglitz, Schnoebelen, Mazzeffi, Tueffel, Rage and Wahl. They are coached by Jim Paschall and Bill Kasten. This is the first season of football for the Tarantulas and while they started well, they have faltered since midseason. Waning attendance and lack of practice and experience should show in their play. Nevertheless, they will be determined to pull a big upset on Thanksgiving.

The end sweep has helped the Centipedes all season. They will also have the great kicking of Chris Nogulich to keep them out of danger. The fine passing of Portera and Fruend will aid their offense considerably. The defense is tough and hard to get through and is led by Rick Meidel. The Eagles will have the fine running of Bill Veith and Larry Dyrda to lead their offense. Veith has led the Eagles to many victories on his passes to Tom Jennings and Tom Fatisz. Their most effective play has been the end sweep. Steve Viskup has done an excellent job of kicking all season long. Roger McLinkovich and Marty Pistone have played good defensive ball all year for the Eagles.

LEO WOLINS IS DEAD

Mr. Leo Wolins, one of our board members since 1934 is dead. He was critically injured in a fall on Friday, November 20th in Beverly Hills, California where he resided since 1946.

In the early years of N.B.C. his zealous efforts in helping to organize the boys besides counseling them, helping them with their math problems, etc. were one of the greatest contributing factors in the eventual success of the Neighborhood Boys Club. He organized the Forum and was the Chairman from 1934 to 1946 when he moved to Beverly Hills, California.

In business he was a general contractor and construction engineer and as such erected numerous housing projects in the Pittsburgh area during the late 40's and early 50's. Presently he was the head of a large fire door manufacturing company in Los Angeles. Although he lived a few thousand miles from the Club he remained active; he never missed being a timer at our annual Memorial Track Meet and remained one of our best financial contributors. He did a great deal of charitable work for all denominations and we now trust that God will grant him eternal peace and happiness.
