Our 36th annual THANKSGIVING DAY FOOTBALL CLASSICS will again be held at Paul Revere Park on THURSDAY MORNING. Games will be played on the three gridirons every hour on the hour, and even before the sun rises there'll be a steady stream of enthusiastic football players arriving at the park to play the first three games of the morning at 8:00 o'clock -- where can you match that spirit?

Special practice sessions are being held by many of the teams for the big day, and we're sure there'll be plenty of excitement and thrills especially if we're blessed again with good weather - like we've had the past four years. HOLIDAY TOURNAMENT INDOOR SOFTBALL RULES

The 1st HOLIDAY TOURNAMENT will start on Monday, November 28th. The elimination tournament will be held at the gymnasium. The winners will receive SPECIAL RECOGNITION on the day of the final game. For INDOOR SOFTBALL and the rules will be discussed at your meeting this week.

1. All men are allowed to play. The minimum age is 17.
2. All active members present must play at least 3 innings. If an inning is not reached by 20 minutes before the time limit, the official will call an extra player in for the game at the end of the inning in progress.
3. If a batted ball strikes the wall of the gym or the basket, the ball remains in play. The batter receives credit for a hit if the ball is caught before it reaches the floor, or any other object.
4. Any batted ball that strikes the wall or ceiling in fair territory and then bounces foul will be considered a fair ball.
5. If a batted ball strikes the wall or any object without striking the back wall it remains in play and is not out, if the ball strikes the floor.
6. A batted ball that strikes the balcony or the rafters is out.
7. A foul ball is a ball that strikes the back wall or any object behind the back wall.
8. A ball may not be thrown into the wall. If it is, then the ball remains in play.
9. Pitching is as fast as you can throw. Windups are not allowed. The pitcher must step back 10 feet from the batter. Only one step is allowed.
10. The pitcher's foot must be on the pitcher's plate when the pitcher starts the windup.
11. The batter may step out of the batter's box to hold the bat with either hand.
12. A foul ball is a ball that strikes the outfielder or the floor. The ball is out if it strikes the floor within the time scheduled.

HOLIDAY TOURNAMENT INDOOR SOFTBALL RULES

The big HOLIDAY TOURNAMENT will start on Monday, November 28th. A double elimination tournament will be held. The winners will receive SPECIAL RIBBONS in the gym on the day of the final game. The rules for INDOOR SOFTBALL are as follows; they will be discussed at your meetings this week.

1. 11 men are allowed to play with a minimum of 7.
2. All active members present must play at least 3 innings. If the 4th inning is not reached by 20 minutes before the time limit, the official will order all extra players in the game at the close of the inning in progress.
3. If a batted ball hits the back wall of the gym or the basketball backboard, the ball remains in play and the batter receives credit for a hit, even though the ball is caught before striking the floor, or any other object.
4. Any batted ball that hits the side wall or ceiling in fair territory and then bounces foul will be considered a fair ball.
5. If a batted ball hits the side walls or any beams without striking the back wall it remains in play and the batter is out if the ball is caught before striking the floor.
6. A batted ball that drops into the balcony over the screen is a homerun.
7. A foul ball if touched first by the catcher, and then caught after hitting the back wall or backboard is not out.
8. A ball may not be trapped against the wall - if it is, then it's a hit and remains in play.
9. Pitching is as fast as you can throw. Windups are not allowed, and when starting the pitch, both feet must on the line. Only one step is allowed.
10. Players are allowed to bunt. Two upshorts may be used and one deep short.
11. Players may steal 2nd and 3rd but not home. In order to steal a runner must hold the base until after the pitch passes the batter.
12. A forfeit may be declared against the offending team if they do not have enough boys to play within 15 minutes of the time scheduled.

YOU MUST WEAR GYM SHOES

Gym shoes must be worn when you play. To keep the floor real clean it is important that you carry your gyms and not wear them through the snow and mud.
