FOOTBALL CLASSICS ON THURSDAY, THANKSGIVING DAY

3 GAMES EVERY HOUR ON THE HOUR

On Thursday, November 23rd, the 37th annual Thanksgiving Day Football Classics will be held on the three gridirons at Paul Revere Park. Games will be in progress as early as 8:00 A.M. and on every succeeding hour six different teams will take over the fields of battle. Each team will play one of their toughest opponents, and in several of the leagues, championships will be at stake. Since the start of the season in Mid-September, the teams have been pointing to be at their best for these big games; now they're awaiting the zero hour! Thanksgiving Day has always seen some of the biggest upsets and surprises - like last year when the "underdog" Vikings rose to the occasion and beat the Astros 27 to 14. The game didn't mean a thing in the standings as both teams were near the bottom, but the Astros had won twice as many games during the season, however that was all forgotten - IT WAS THANKSGIVING DAY!

To add to the spirit of the games, about 50 girl cheerleaders, most of whom have brothers in the Club, will be on hand for every game. Officiating will be handled by Alumni of N.B.C. and our Dads Club will be helping on the field and wherever needed, and like in past years will serve refreshments to the players and parents after every game.

Parking facilities have been made available by Victor-Comptometer so be sure to tell your parents and friends. In past years, sometimes it was just impossible to find parking space within a few blocks - not it's available Free right next to the park with entrances at Irving Park & Rockwell and Campbell & Byron.

IMPORTANT: Be sure to be in the clubhouse at least 1/2 hour before the starting time of your game. The clubhouse will be open at 7:00 A.M. Each team will have a separate dressing room in the clubhouse and all boys should use the east entrance. If the fields are frozen wear gloves; if it's warm, you'll probably be playing in a sea of mud so be sure to bring clean clothes. Also, if you want a good rooting section, it's up to your team members to each bring out about 10 people.

PEP RALLY ON WEDNESDAY

On Wednesday evening, November 22nd, a huge Pep Rally will be held in the Clubhouse to kick off the Big Football Classics. All Americans in each of the leagues, voted by player opponents, officials and coaches, will be announced, and certificates of Merit will be awarded to each boy mentioned for a rememberance. 



1. 11 men are allowed to play with a minimum of 7 men.

2. All active members present must play at least 3 innings. If the 4th inning is not reached by 20 minutes before the time limit, the official will order all extra players in the game at the close of the inning in progress.

3. If a batted ball hits the back wall of the bym or the basketball backboard, the ball remains in play and the batter receives credit for a hit, even though the ball is caught before striking the floor, or any other object.

4. Any batted ball that hits the side wall or ceiling in fair territory and then bounces foul will be considered a fair ball.

5. If a batted ball hits the side walls or any beams without striking the back wall it remains in play and the batter is out if the ball is caught before striking the floor.

6. A batted ball that drops into the balcony over the screen is a home run, A foul ball if touched first by the catcher, and then caught after hitting the 7. bauk wall or backboard is not out.

8. A ball may not be trapped against the wall - if it is, then it's a hit and the ball remains in play.

9. Pitching is as fast as you can throw. Windups are not allowed, and when starting the pitch, both feer must be on the line. Only one step is allowed.

Players are allowed to bunt. Two up-shorts may be used and one deep short.
 Players may steal 2nd and 3rd but not home. In order to steal a runner must

hold the base until after the pitch passes the batter,
