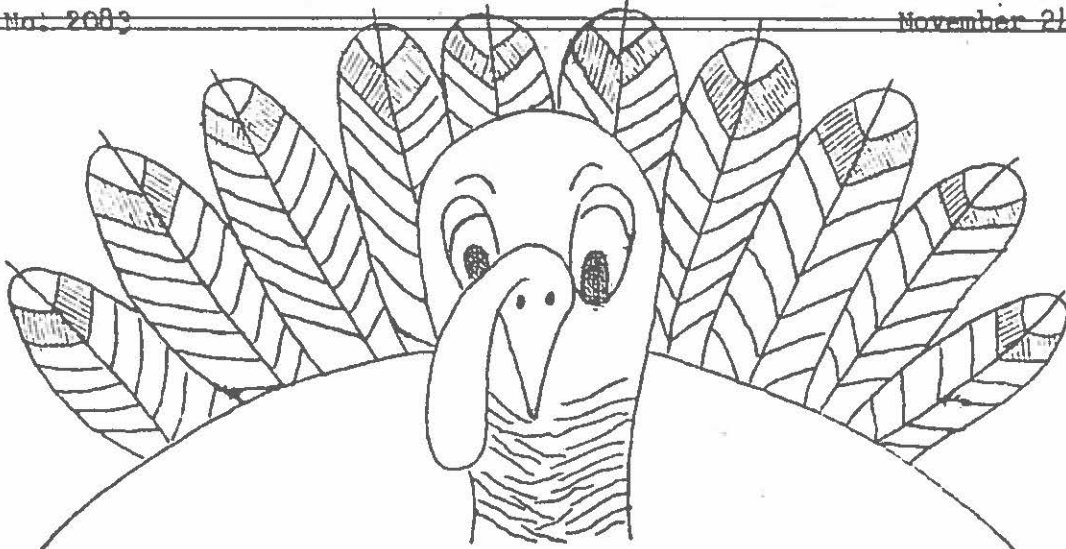

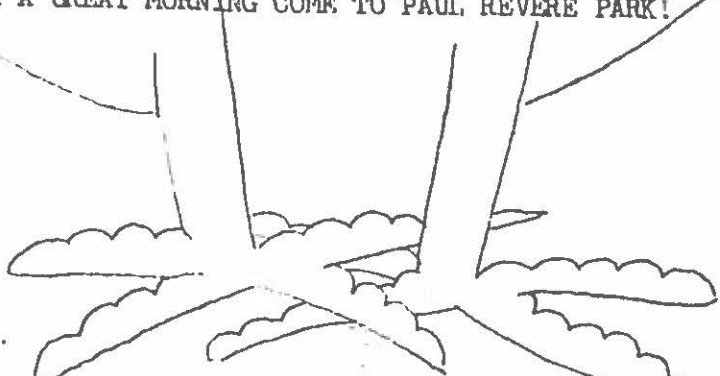
Our 45th annual THANKSGIVING DAY FOOTBALL CLASSICS will be held on Thursday, November 27th. The first three games will be at 8 A.M.

INDOOR SOFTBALL & KICKBALL RULES

1. All boys are allowed to play with a minimum of 7. Two up-sports and one deep shortstop should be used. Bunting is permitted.
2. A forfeit may be declared after 15 minutes of the scheduled time.
3. All active members present must play at least 3 innings. If the 4th inning is not reached by 20 minutes before the time limit, the official must order all the extra players in the game at the close of the inning in progress.
4. If a batted ball hits the back wall of the gym or the basketball backboard the ball remains in play and the batter receives credit for a hit even though the ball is caught before striking the floor or any other object.
5. Any batted or kicked that hits the side wall or ceiling in fair territory and the bounces foul will be considered a fair ball.
6. If a batted or kicked ball hits the side walls or any beams without striking the back wall, it remains in play and the batter is out if it is caught before striking the floor.
7. A batted ball that drops into the balcony over the screen is a homerun.
8. A foul ball, if touched first by the catcher, and then caught after hitting the back wall or backboard is not out.
9. A ball may not be trapped against the wall - if it is, then it's a hit and remains in play.
10. Pitching is as fast as you can throw. Windups are not allowed, and when starting the pitch, both feet must be on the rubber or line. Only ONE step is allowed from that position.
11. Players are allowed to bunt.
12. Players may steal 2nd or 3rd but NOT HOME. In order to steal 2nd or 3rd the runner must hold the base until after the pitch passes the batter.
