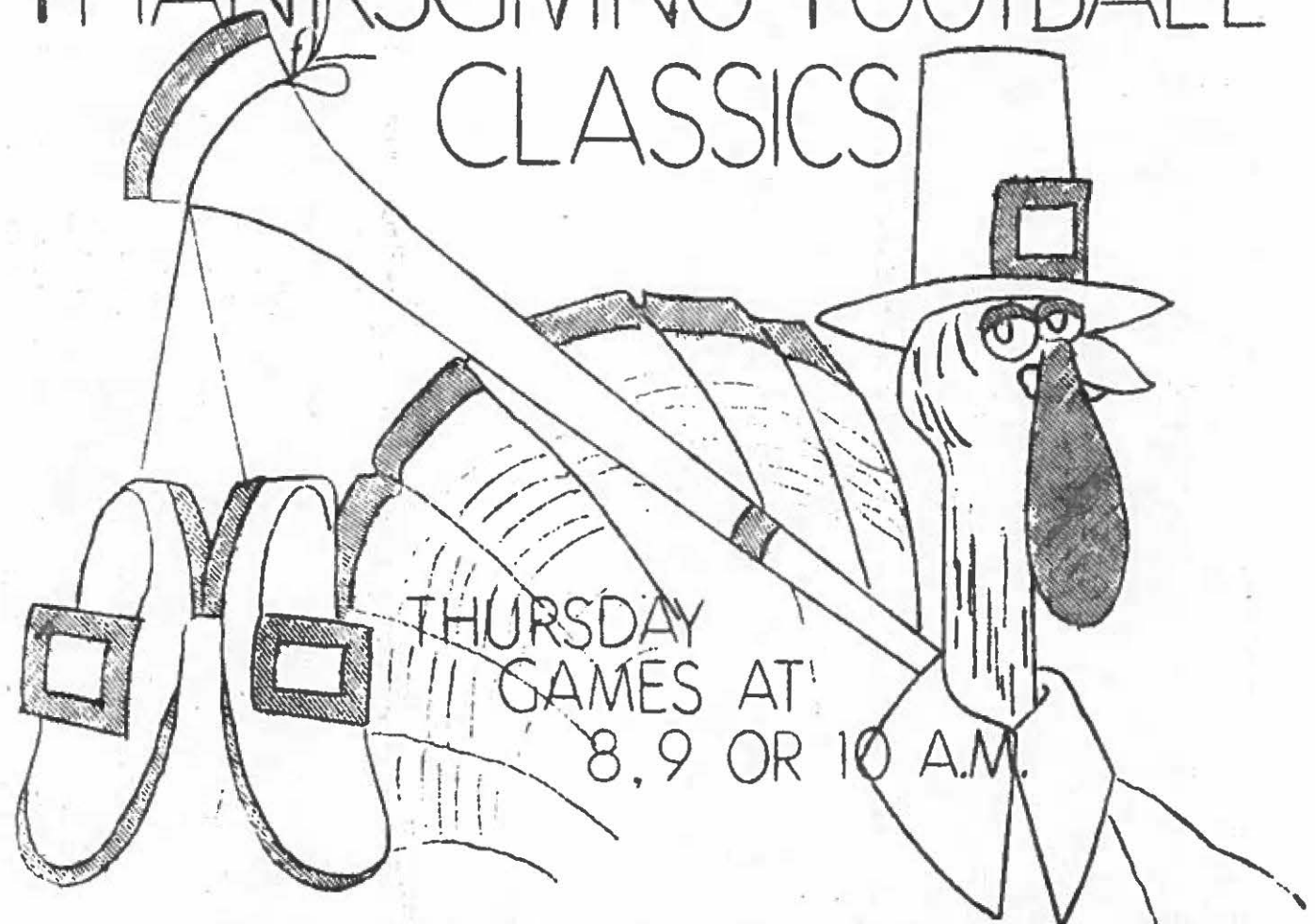

THANKSGIVING • FOOTBALL CLASSICS



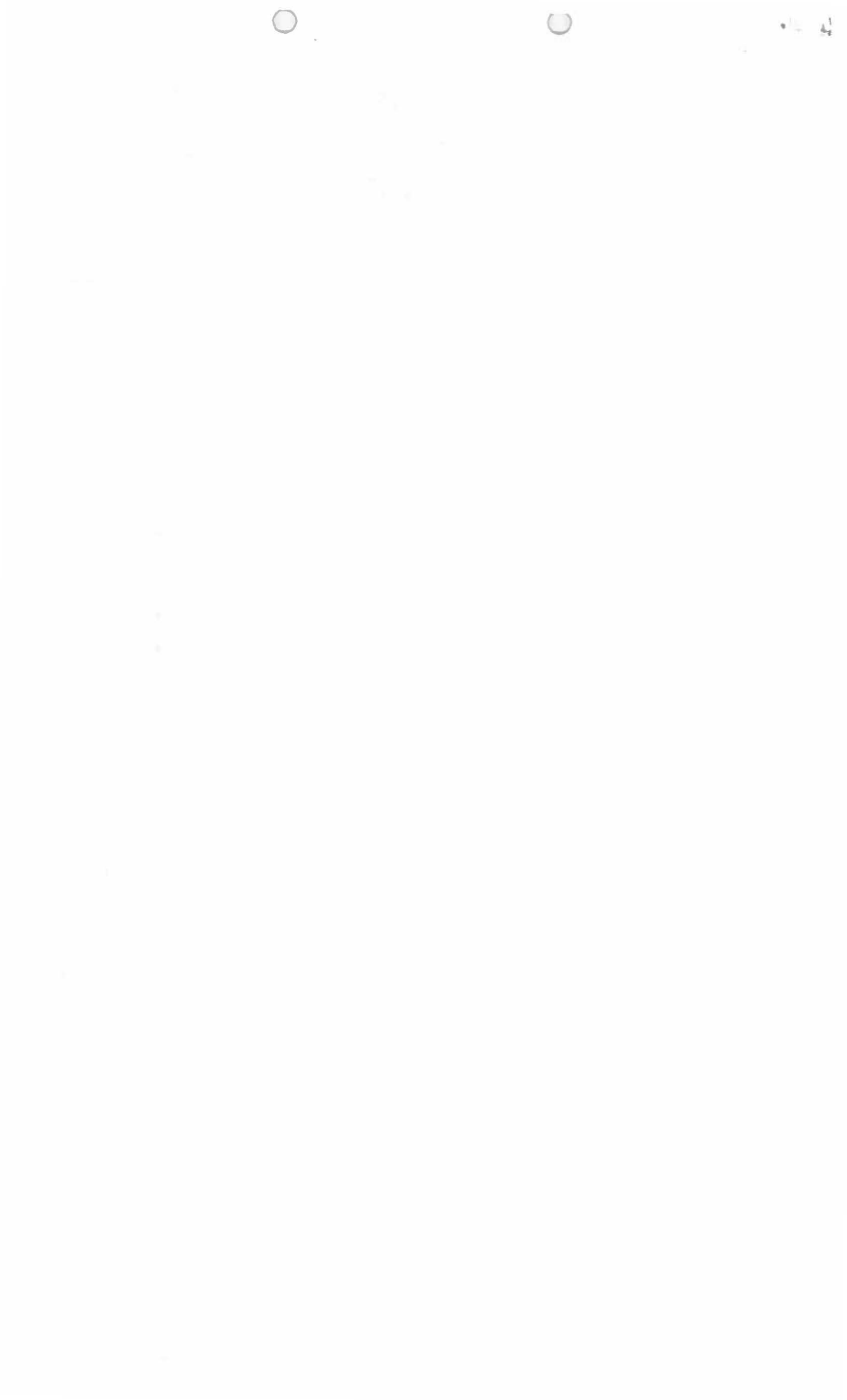

GRIDIRON NO. 1 - TRIBE BOBCATS VS. FALCONS : This strong Tribe League match will be a battle to the finish. The Bobcats have one of the best offenses in the game, but in their previous games the Falcons pulled out a victory. The Bobcats squeaked by to win the three other games.

The Bobcats, led by QB Gabe Martinez, have the third best offense in the Tribe League, having scored 141 points this year. Their offense, which works out of the T-Formation, relies on the power of Luis Soto and the speed of Jesse Martinez. Gabe calls all of the plays, and they have been most successful passing. Gabe throws deep to either Cesar Milian or Brian Carter, or tosses a quick screen to Soto in the backfield. Gabe, Cesar, and Luis lead the team in scoring. Cesar does the placekicking and Eric Cottongim handles the punting. Their offensive success would not have been possible without the fine blocking of the offensive line. The Bobcats feel that they turned around when they got their coach and that he has instilled team spirit and discipline in them. It shows in that their attendance has picked up substantially since he joined them. Coach Mackey holds practice three times a week, and works his team well. They feel that they would like to win against the Bees since they are their toughest opponent. They also think that they will win on Turkey Day because they have "screeeeching spirit". 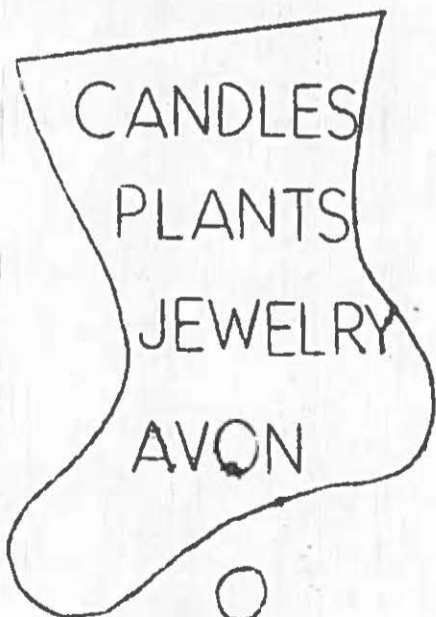

The Raiders clinched the Tribe Red Division championship by winning both halves. They were 6-1-2 in the first half and 7-1 in the second half for an overall 13-2-2 record.
