Your football uniform must be returned cleaned on one of the dates listed below or you will not be allowed to play hockey!

A full \$5.00 refund will be given to those who return their uniforms on Saturday, November 28th, from 9:00 until 1:00; or from 3:30 until 5:00 on Monday or Tuesday, November 30th or December 1st. These are the only full refund days! A late penalty will be assessed starting on Wednesday, December 2nd. Those who return their uniforms on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, or Saturday, December 2nd, 3rd, 4th, or 5th, will only receive \$2.00! Those who have not brought in their uniforms by Saturday, December 5th, will be disqualified from hockey, and will be required to pay a double deposit for the next uniformed sport! If you can not return the uniform in person, have a friend, teammate, or family member drop it off for you! There is no excuse for being late with your return!

Before bringing your uniform in, make sure that the jersey has been washed well (try Miracle White) and that all tears have been sewn. Scrub and polish your helmet, and remove tape, stickers, or marker. Rubbing alcohol will help. There will be a \$2.00 fine for returning a dirty jersey (or torn), a dirty helmet, or for losing a chin strap.

HOCKEY RULES

1. A game consists of three periods of 15 minutes each. Forfeit time is 15 minutes after game time. Tribe teams must have 4 players to start a game, and Prep teams must have 3.

2. Tribe teams will have 6 players on the floor at a time - 1 rover, 1 goalie, 2 offensemen, and 2 defensemen. Prep teams will have 4 men on the floor - 1 rover, 1 goalie, 1 offenseman, and 1 defenseman. Prep teams play halfcourt.

3. A goal may only be scored as the result of a shot. Kicking, batting, or directing the puck into the net is not a goal.

4. Face-offs take place when the puck enters the net for any reason; when the goalie holds the puck for more than 3 seconds (see rule 13); after a penalty is called; at the start of a period; after an official's time out; when the puck becomes entangled in the netting or in a player's clothing; or when the puck is impeded from play for any reason.

5. Free substitution will be allowed in the third period only, provided that all players played a full period prior to the start of the third period. Substitutions are only allowed between whistles.

6. The Boys Club will supply the sticks. You may not use your own stick.

7. Only the official may call time out.

8. Penalties are grouped as minor, major, and misconduct.

a. Any player, except the goalie, will serve two minutes for a minor. If a goalie commits a minor, a defenseman serves the penalty.

b. Any player, including the goalie, will serve 5 minutes for a major. Two majors in a game cause ejection.

c. A player is ejected for a misconduct. Two misconducts in a season cause ejection for the season!

9. A minor penalty is called for the following;

a. Delay of game.

b. Raising the stick blade above waist level while shooting or playing the puck.

c. Deliberately freezing or falling on the puck. Goalie is subject to 9-d. A penalty will not be called if the puck becomes lodged in a player's clothing.

d. The goalie will receive a warning if he does not make an honest attempt to clear the puck after a save. The second time will cause a penalty.

e. Batting the puck at any time. It is legal to let the puck bounce off of your hand or to catch it and set it down immediately. Do not direct it.

f. Holding an opponent.

g. Interfering with the progress of an opponent, purposely knocking the stick from a player's hands, preventing a player from recovering a loose stick, or interfering from the player's box or penalty box.

h. Curving your stick.

i. Stepping across the center line.

10. A minor penalty may be called for:

a. Hooking an opponent's body with your stick. Stick-to-stick contact is legal.

b. Swinging the stick at an opponent, even if no contact is made.

c. Spearing or attempting to spear with your stick.

d. Throwing your stick for any reason.

e. Tripping an opponent with stick or body.

f. Checking or using any rough, unnecessary contact. Play the puck, not the man.

11. A misconduct may be called for:

a. Using profane language or gestures, showing disrespect towards the officials, or shooting the puck away from an official.

b. Attempting to or deliberately injuring a player.

c. Being involved in a fight.

12. A 5 minute major will be called for high sticking and hitting an opponent with the high stick.

13. The goalie will be treated as any other player once he leaves the immediate area of the goalmouth. He cannot freeze the puck once he leaves that area.

14.a. During a minor penalty, the penalized player comes back in when a player of the opposing team scores.

b. When a player is called for a major, a sub enters the box with him. The sub serves a full 2 minutes, even if a power-play goal is scored. The penalized player serves 5 full minutes, and re-enters the game at the first face off after his time is up.

c. A sub serves 2 minutes when a misconduct is called. He serves 2 full minutes, even if the oppositioj scores.

15. All players must wear clean, dry gym shoes in order to play.

16. The official makes any decision not specifically covered in the rules.

17. Overtime is only played during the playoffs.
