NBC FLOOR HOCKEY RULES

All Prep (new Tribe) and Tribe (new Teen) floor hockey games will be played in the Revere Park Gym. All players must be wearing clean, dry gym shoes and an NBC team t-shirt for every game. Players without the proper uniform will not be able to play in that day's game. No one can play in socks, and there are no exceptions for not having your shirt. If you can borrow from a sub you can play.

1. A game consists of three periods of 15 minutes each - running time. Forfeit time is 15 minutes after game time. Teams must have at least 4 players present in order to start a game.
2. Games will be full court with 6 players on the floor for each side. There is 1 rover who may go anywhere, 1 goalie, two offensemen, and 2 defensemen. Tell the refs when you change rovers.
3. A goal may be scored only as the result of a shot. Kicking, batting, or otherwise directing the puck in is not a goal.
4. Face offs take place when the puck enters the net for any reason, when the goalie holds the puck for more than three seconds (see rule 12), or to resume play after any whistle.
5. Free substitution will be allowed only during the third period, provided that all players played a complete period before the start of the third. Subs can enter at any whistle, not on the fly.
6. The Boys' Club will supply the sticks. Do not bring your stick with, as it will not be allowed in the gym.
7. Only the ref may call a timeout.
8. Penalties are grouped as minor, major, and misconduct.
 - a. For a minor any player except the goalie will be sent to the box for 2 minutes. If the goalie commits a minor, a defenseman serves.
 - b. Any player, including the goalie, will serve 5 minutes for a major. A sub may enter after two minutes of the penalty elapse. Two majors in a game cause ejection.
 - c. A player will be ejected for any misconduct, and a sub must serve two minutes. Two misconducts in a season could cause ejection for the season.

When a penalty is called on a player, you lose that position for the penalty time. If the rover commits a minor, for example, you do not make another player rover until the penalty ends. You have to do without your rover.

MORE HOCKEY RULES AND INFORMATION ARE ON PAGE 3. BE SURE TO FILL IN YOUR TEAM WITH THOSE WHO DID NOT PLAY FOOTBALL.

9. A minor is called for:
 - a. Delay of game
 - b. Raising the stick blade above the waist while shooting or playing the puck.
 - c. Deliberately falling on or freezing the puck. Goalie is subject to 9-d. A penalty will not be called if the puck becomes entangled in a player's clothing.
 - d. Failure of the goalie to make an honest attempt to clear the puck after a save. If he holds the puck for more than 3 seconds when not under pressure he will be warned that the next time causes a penalty for delay of the game.
 - e. Batting the puck at any time. It is legal to let the puck hit your hand or to catch it and set it down. Do not direct it.
 - f. Holding an opponent in any way.
 - g. Any interference of an opponent, the deliberate knocking of the stick from a player's hands or preventing a player from regaining his lost stick, interference with play from the bench or penalty box, physical contact with the goalie unless the puck is in the area.
 - h. Curving your stick.
 - i. Stepping across the center line to play the puck unless you are the rover. It is legal to reach your stick over the line.

10. A minor or major can be called for:
 - a. Hooking an opponent's body with your stick. Stick to stick contact is legal.
 - b. Slashing or swinging the stick at an opponent, even if no contact is made.
 - c. Spearing or attempting to spear.
 - d. Throwing the stick for any reason.
 - e. Tripping an opponent with stick or body.
 - f. Using any rough contact or checking.

PLAY THE PUCK, NOT THE MAN.

11. A misconduct may be called for:
 - a. Swearing or using abusive language toward players or refs, showing disrespect for the refs, arguing with the refs, or intentionally shooting the puck away from a ref who is retrieving it.
 - b. Attempting to injure a player.
 - c. Being involved in a fight.

12. The goalie is treated as any other player once he leaves the immediate area of the goalmouth. He cannot freeze the puck, and would have to serve any minor.

13. A 5 minute major is called for hitting an opponent with a high stick.

14. a. During a minor penalty the penalized player comes back in if the opposition scores a powerplay goal, unless there is an even strength penalty disadvantage.
- b. When a major is called, the penalized player must serve 5 full minutes, no matter how many goals the other team scores. A sub comes in for the penalized after the first two full minutes are served. The penalized player may re-enter the game at the first face off after his 5 minutes are up.
- c. A sub will serve two full minutes for a misconduct, and the penalized player must leave the Fieldhouse.

- 15. All players must wear their NBC team t-shirt and clean, dry gym shoes in order to play.
- 16. Overtime will only be played during playoffs.
- 17. If a team forfeits two games, it may be taken out of the schedule and playoffs.
- 18. The refs have the authority to make any decisions not specifically covered in the rules.

USE OF THE GYM AND LOCKER ROOM

There are some rules set down as far as use of the Revere facilities go. Park Supervisor Terry O'Malley has been kind in giving us the use of the gym and locker room four days each week, but we have to take care of them!

To ensure that our activities do not get in each other's way, players should enter the building no sooner than 15 minutes before game time. When you enter, come in the back door by the light tower, and go directly downstairs into the locker room. You should not be hanging around in the lobby or balcony. The balcony is mainly for spectators! If you go up there and run around you may be asked to leave the building..

Keep in mind that you cannot play a game unless you are wearing your NBC team t-shirt and clean, dry gym shoes. Street shoes, boots, and dirty gym shoes are bad for the floor! You cannot play in socks, or in a t-shirt other than your present team's NBC t-shirt. This rule is in effect with the first regular season games on November 27th! The shirts are available for \$3.50, and are necessary so that the refs can tell which teams the players are on.

Also, pop, candy, and gum are not allowed in the gym or locker room! The locker room will be locked when the game starts, but it still a good idea to bring a combination lock for your possessions. **DO NOT BRING VALUABLES!** The Park and Boys' Club are not responsible for any lost items!
