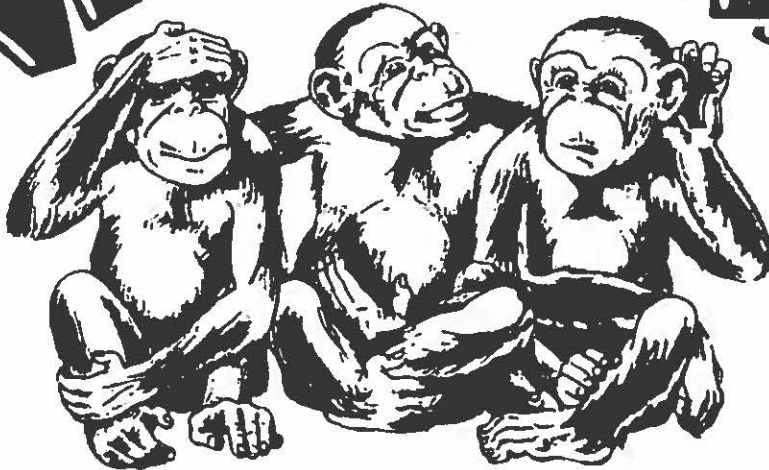

HAPPY ANNIVERSARY NBC!

It was 55 years ago today that the Neighborhood Boys Club was born. On October 19, 1931, the Ghosts and Trojans battled to a 13-13 tie as Dick Valentin and Bill Banedt officiated the first of the over 10,750 football games that we have played. While you are out there today, the memories of the Ghosts and Trojans will also be out on the same fields where NBC began.

The headline of today's Monkeyshine is the same headline that was used when the first issue was printed on September 9, 1932.

TEAM PICTURES TAKEN NEXT SATURDAY!

KEEP BIKES OUTSIDE AND AWAY FROM THE FIELDS!

55 YEARS IN REVIEW

1931 - The Neighborhood Boys Club was founded by Robert Buehler in October. It was then known as the Paul Revere League. There were 6 teams in that first league, and the very first game was played between the Galloping Ghosts and the Trojans on October 19, 1931. It ended in a 13-13 tie. Harry Haverhill was the outstanding football player of the year. The first champions were the "Reveres", and their championship medals were presented by legendary Hall of Fame football star Red Grange in the brand new Paul Revere Park Fieldhouse.

1932 - It was time to find a name for the Club, and the first name was the Anakigjig Boys Club. Milo Henke came up with the name. The Anakigjigs were an Algonquin tribe that hunted in the area, and the name stood for "we serve". The first Clubhouse was located where the playground is, and it was an old, dilapidated house. Mr. John O'Shea, a neighborhood pioneer, made it possible to use the house. Eddie Short, former White Sox general manager, was doing a fine job as the Spartan quarterback. Comedian George Gobel won a football in the first Pumpkin Carving contest.

1933 - Since nobody could pronounce "Anakigjig", the club was named the Neighborhood Boys Club by Mr. Buehler. Mrs. Carl Buehler, mother of Robert Buehler, named the Club newspaper "Monkeyshines". The kids worked hard to get 10,000 votes for George Gobel as he finished second in a radio contest. Wally Bleidistel hurled his second straight no hitter for NBC in the American Legion Tourney. 800 people attended an NBC outdoor band concert. Money raised at our Christmas play went toward delivering a truckload of food to the poor. Times were so hard that old Christmas trees were collected to stoke the boiler.

1934 - Elroy Sandquist Sr. had 4 hits as the Spartan dads beat the sons. A feature of the summer picnic was a bicycle race from the Club to Caldwell Woods with a police escort. Jack Banner of the Cobras caught 10 passes, intercepted 4, and scored 3 TD's as they beat the Trojans.

1935 - The Ghosts had one hit off of Wally Bleidistel to give Bill Knab a 1-0 no hit win over the Reveres. Frank Platek, who now heads "ACT NOW" in the Falcon area, was the NBC hero when he singled with 2 outs in the 9th at Sox Park to win the County Legion Title. The team later won the state and regional titles, but lost in the western finals to Sacramento. Successive homers by Bill Nickels, John Christl, and Ralph Cuny helped the NBC Jounior team win the city Legion Tournament.

1936 - George Hasback had 3 singles, a double, and a homer as the Flashes beat the Sparks. Chick Banner limited the Melin-Romers to one hit as NBC won their second straight city title.

1937 - NBC purchased a 25 passenger bus for trips. The band was dropped, and the instruments were given to the Uhlich Home and Lakeview High School.

1938 - Frenchy Hoskins and Jack Vogel were the top swimmers, and the top chess players were Vern Turco, Roy Terp, and Warren Donarski. Tony Rebel (.485) and Carl Koller (.475) led their leagues in batting. Tony Krier, John Johnson, Stan Sipiora, and Chuck Sipiora lwd thw soccer team to second place in the city tournament.

1939 - More than 100 boys took part in a Marble Tournament. The Dodgers won the "Team Mile" contest and won a 3 day trip to White Pines State Park. The stars of our Christmas play were Mutz Bartlett as "Scrooge", Red Anderson, Ray Baumhart (now President of Loyola University), Ed Elenz, Hank Aeberli, Dick and Bob Marquette, Don Samuelson, Leo "Moon" Meyer, Bob Emmerich, and Louis Walter.

1940 - There were 177 players in a checker tournament. Over 300 attended the first NBC Father and Son banquet. Father and Son softball games were played regularly. Pete Krier won his 5th year "For Better Men" award.

1941 - Skip Baumhart won a hat in the Jimmy Evans sports contest. Our top ping pong players were Bob Mergens, Gordie Falknor, Rog Mutter, and Skip Baumhart. The Ravens string of not being short for a game or meeting hit 26 months. "The Spirit of Christmas" play was put on in the Lane Tech Auditorium.

1942 - 43 boys skated in a tournament despite 10 below weather. The "You and Me" column was named by Dick Swanborg. Ken Lewan served as Chief Justice of the Municipal Court for a day. A bi-weekly service paper with NBC news was sent to our boys in the service all over the world.

1943 - Marty Joyce became NBC's first war casualty at Guadalcanal. In his letter home he wrote, "It is a great honor to fight and die for a country such as ours." Mr. Cas Urban organized the NBC Choir. Jack Berlinger of the Old Blackhawks wrote, "How can the enemy expect to win this war with all the NBC'ers on one team?" The play "Christmas and the Four Seasons" was presented to 2500 at the Lane Auditorium.

1944 - The Raiders were football champs, scoring 406 points during the season while not allowing the opposition a point. Gorgy Falknor received his 5th year "For Better Men" award.

1945 - Lee Davis of the Bears put out a fire in the Club attic, even though he suffered burns. Jim Marmitt received the Purple Heart. Vern Simmons was wounded in action. The war ends, and NBC members who fought had a reunion at the Edgewater Beach Hotel. The great line of Bob Schaeffer, Bob Simmons, Ralph Stahl, and Dick Geschrey led the Radiers to their 4th football title in 5 years.

1946 - Jack Pittges, Bill Wedell, and Ralph Stahl set Track records. Johnny Groth of the Midgets made his big league debut with the Detroit Tigers at Sox Park.

1947 - Dick Valentin and Mr. Buehler returned from Pasadena where they saw Illinois bowl over UCLA 45-14 in the Rose Bowl. Jerry Jarvis (father of Jeff and Brian) made the wrestling team at Lane Tech. Jerry Baumhart won the 1st Basketball Achievement Contest.

1948 - Jack Costanza, former Trojan, was recognized as the best bongo player in the world. Jack Pittges claimed the Daggars had won 41 straight basketball games from 1945-47. Mr. Buehler caught a 35 lb. Muskie.

1949 - 183 boys shot in the free throw contest, and the winners were Ray Germann, Paul Goerner (father of Paul and Scott), and Bill Glasson. Nat King Cole was a guest at the annual Christmas Show. Cas Urban led the NBC Choir of 120 boys on WGN on Christmas Eve.

1950 - Duane Dublinski took top honors in the Sun-Times ping pong tournament. Paul Goerner's 4 hit shutout of the Jokers is the highlight of the Softball Classics. Bob and Joe Hutmacher and Don Turschmann made the Loyola basketball team. George Gobel performed in the NBC version of "A Christmas Carol", which was directed by Miss Marie Valentin.

1951 - Sebby Lombardo was a hero, saving the life of an invalid in a fire. Johnny Groth, Marv Rotblatt, and Bill "Moose" Skowron, all former members, left for spring training with the Tigers, White Sox, and Yankees. The Track Meet was rained out for the first time in 19 years, but was made up on the 4th of July. Winners of our first golf tourney were Harold Schramm and Russ Martin.

55 YEARS IN REVIEW

1952 - Ron Arens stops Ray Geimann's string of 4 straight "Mr. Basketball" titles. Horseshoe winners were James Baumhart, Billy Fischer, and Dick Geib. The Dragons lost to the sparks to stop a 30 game winning streak. Dennis Ryan and Dave Schray save Clubhouse from fire.

1953 - John Pfeiffer set a record by making 22 out of 25 in the Free Throw Contest. Dr. Harold Shafter watched in awe as Don "Czar" Wilhelm blasted a 340 yard drive to birdie a 430 yard hole. Howie Cluever booted 17 extra points.

1954 - Bob Kosick made an unassisted triple play in an indoor softball game - the second in 23 years. Former member Johnny Groth was traded to the White Sox. The Commanches had their string of 24 straight basketball wins broken. 1500 people watched Jim Kneip set a new triple broad jump record at the Track Meet. NBC held its first Carnival. Over 400 boys play in mud and water as they battle on Thanksgiving. George Gobel is rated the top comedian in the country.

1955 - Dick Valentin received an alligator in the mail from Jack Pittges. The White Sox decide to sponsor NBC's baseball program this year and donate new uniforms. NBC wins 15 medals at the Junior Olympics. 17 games are played on Thanksgiving, and the champs are the Leathernecks, Spiders, Hornets, Warriors, Monarchs, and the Gorillas. Plans were started for building a new Clubhouse.

1956 - Jim and John Kelly helped St. Ben's defeat St. Leo in a WJJD Quizdown. Ed Short was appointed new secretary of the White Sox. Jim Kneip broke the all time record in the 100 yard dash. Ray Imburgia hit a grand slam in the Little League All-Star game. 30 NBC'ers carried the Olympic Torch in a relay from City Hall to Hanson Park in a meet sponsored by the Illinois Youth Commission. Bill "Moose" Skowron hit a grand slam in the World Series for the Yankees. Mike Pantich played a great game at QB for Michigan State as they beat Notre Dame. Dick Valentin closed the doors of the old Clubhouse, which served the boys for 25 years.

1957 - 180 shot in the Free Throw contest, and John Best set a new mark with 22 out of 25. Duane Wolf set a new record in the Basketball Achievement Contest with 2488 pts. Over \$7000 was collected for a new Clubhouse in a door-to-door drive. Ground was broken for the new building on Memorial Day. Ralph Stahl coaches NBC to first place in the Junior Olympics. The fields are covered with 5" of snow on October 26th. Football champs are the Spiders, Fireflies, Locusts, Wasps, Blackhawks, Warriors, and Copperheads.

1958 - Dennis Milewski wins the City High School skating title in the 880. The new Clubhouse opens. The Locusts hold the first team party in the new building. Tony Saffo runs for a 50 yard TD in the closing seconds to give the Panthers their only defeat of the year on a cold Thanksgiving.

1959 - Tom Stiglic took all the honors in the ice skating meet. Ray Imburgia set a new Free Throw record with 23 out of 25 for 12-13 year olds, and Dennis Rued did it in the older group. Rich Friz made the city finals in checkers. Rose Friz and Albie Olzewski made drapes for the Clubhouse. The neighborhood is stunned when air raid sirens go off as the Sox win the pennant.

1960-65 - Bob Fahey set a new record for 10 year olds with 17 free throws. Winners of "Mr. Basketball" were Steve Hoffman, Mike Schneider, Mike McNamara, Ken Hanneman, and Bob Fahey.

1960-65 - Mike Schneider was the first boy to score 2300 points or more four times in the Basketball Achievement Contest. An Easter Egg Hunt for 500 boys and girls is held each year. Rich Brandon started working at the Club in September of 1960. He is now the Executive Director. Rich started the Paul Bunyon Events that year. Ed Short was appointed General Manager of the White Sox. Chuck Logan is named captain of the Northwestern Wildcats football team. Herb Veith was out on the fields coaching every day wherever a team needed help. Our Christmas Nativity scene came from Frank Scherer. Rich Brandon and some members were on the Bozo Circus. George Wild, the NBC Einstein, received awards for his thermo electricity experiment, which was the best in the nation. Alvin Motors starts sponsoring our Punt, Pass, and Kick contest. Three Fahey boys shot in different age groups in the Free Throw contest, and all finished first. Robert Buehler was elected mayor of Galena in 1965.

1966-70 - A Gun Safety program with bb guns is started and dads act as volunteer instructors. Toboggan trips were held for the teams. The record-breaking snow of 1967 hit, and was 4 to 5 feet deep around NBC. Everyone was advised to take a week off and play in the snow. Gerry Baumann was the top ping pong player. Chad Vitello won a trip to the Inauguration in Washington for his essay, "The President as a Leader". Oliver Lund painted our ping pong tables. 1630 people attended the 35th Anniversary banquet at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in 1966. Speakers included Robert Buehler, Joe Garagiola, Bill Skowron, Chuck Logan, the Rev. Ray Baumhart, Ernie Banks, Mike Pyle, and Dick Valentin. "Mr. Basketball" winners in these years were Bruce Stake, Jim Kartheiser, Bob Kartheiser, Tim Fahey, and Mick Schmidt. Leader Rich Paschall won a \$1,000 scholarship. Jim Kartheiser made 20 timed shots in 30 seconds in the Achievement contest to set a new record. In 1966, the Staff won the first Leader-Staff hockey game 10-9 in overtime. In 1969, Mike Shelby won three trophies in the Junior Olympics. Al Wetta fanned 13 Eagles as he pitched a no hitter for the Hawks. In 1968, Pat Shipbaugh struck out 17 of 18 batters and still lost for the Falcons. Rev. Ray Baumhart, former member, was named President of Loyola University. In 1985, he became the longest serving president - 15 years. A new record was set in 1970 when the Chuck Johnson family registered 6 boys. In 1968, Leader Scholarship awards were earned by Rick Meck, Steve Veith, Jim & Bob Kartheiser, John Schmitz, Bill Abplanalp, Bob Angell, Ron Meck, Rich Paschall, Bruce Stake, Glenn Stahl, Ed Feuling, Guy Vitello, Joe Imburgia, and Rick Meidel. Thanksgiving games in 1966 were played in 69 degree weather. In 1967, Steve Borgert won a trip to Disneyland. On Thanksgiving in 1969, the fields were the worst ever as they were covered with between 1 and 5" of water. The games still went on, even though the ball tended to float away. In 1969, Steve Haftl ran a kickoff back for a TD on Thanksgiving and lost a shoe along the way. NBC Dads go carolling each Christmas, a tradition which started in 1939.

1971-75 - Mike Norman was the top bowler with a 144 average. Jim Sugrue bowled a 211, 84, and 88 in the same series. Troy Nelmark won a trip to Hawaii in a local newspaper contest. Our top ping pong players were Jeff Lobono, Chad Vitello, and Andy Johnson. Robert Buehler was elected to the Loyola Board of Trustees. Winners of "Mr. Basketball" during these years were Pat Fahey, John Latchin, Frank Ganshirt, and Tom Horn (twice). Edition 2000 of the Monkeyshine was printed in 1974. NBC won \$1000 as they were represented by the L.A. Lakers on "Sports Challenge". In 1972, Ralph Lippert scored 2149 points in the Achievement Contest to top his dad's score of 2075 in 1949. Ken Koran came into the Club and asked for a "team Menu". He really wanted a roster. Leader Arpad Horvath received an appointment to the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado. He is now a pilot. Mrs. Grace Milbrandt won \$1063 in 1971 on WMAQ.

55 YEARS IN REVIEW

1971-75 - In 1972, Mike Cumberland was honored by the Board of Directors for being the first boy to complete 500 miles jogging around the park. Jeff Lobono defeated champion Tom Horn in the Ping Pong singles 21-19. Jim Swanson won the Teen checker title, and Steve McNulty did it in the Tribe League. Jim Swanson also won the Teen Chess title, and Pete Xamplas won in the Tribe League. In 1975, George Anari and Jim McNulty went undefeated to win the Open Doubles ping pong tournament. Pete DePaz was the top Pup League ping pong player, while Bob Dogan was in the Prep League. Ron Meck won the Teen ping pong title in 1972 undefeated. In 1973, Mike Cumberland set a new mark in the mile, and Eric Cumberland set a half mile record. In 1974, Tom VanDenBosch of the Cougars sold 61 Boys Benefit books in 4 weeks. In 1971, all baseball and football games are played at California Park while there is drainage work at Revere. Gus "Golden Greek" Melisinas opened the baseball season with a no-hitter, striking out 12 and hitting a grand slam. John Horvath of the Scorpis struck out the side in a softball game. NBC Leader Tom Krier is elected president of St. Bens High School's band. Chuck Johnson of the Wildcats no hit the Eagles in 1975. Eric Cumberland broke the 31 year old record in the mile. In 1971, Bob Stiglic of the Bobcats hit four homers in a row. Doug Kirby pitched both lefty and righty for the Bobcats. Pat Eddy of the Wildcats no hit the Leopards. In 1972-73, the three Swansons - Bill, Don, and Jim - each led their leagues in attendance points. On snowy fields in 1974, a mom asked on Thanksgiving, "Why did the referee smash his handkerchief to the ground?"

1976 - NBC celebrated its 45th Anniversary with a banquet which also marked the retirement of Dick Valentin as NBC Executive Director, a position he held since 1931. Ray Egan was "Mr. Basketball" with 2303 points. 42 teams played in the Open Doubles. Bob Seablom rolled a 247 in the NBC Bowling League. Andy Xamplas and Dave McNulty were checker champs. The Hornets, Cougars, and Buccs won the Paul Bunyon events. PP&K winners were Tom Stone, Mike Rombout, Jeff Potratz, Roland Lump, Kevin Jennings, and Mike Brock. Tad Nelmark had an unassisted triple play in kickball.

1977 - It was the coldest winter in 104 years, but the activities went on as scheduled. Wayne Scharba started the LIFT Physical Fitness Tournament. Bob Phelan, uncle of Cadet Pirate Matthew Suwanski, was "Mr. Basketball" with 2397 points. Don Corso won three gold medals in the Park District gymnastics competition. Andy Lawrence, Larry Soderblom, and Tim Koran tied Track records. Rich Brandon was named NBC Executive Director.

1978 - Mark Flatley tied the 14-15 record in the Free Throw Contest with 23 out of 25. Kevin Hunt won the Basketball Achievement Contest with 2338 points. Dan Diversey set a push up record with 125 in the LIFT Tourney. Mark Flatley had the high series of the year in bowling with a 578. The high average of 154 belonged to John Diversey, and Bill Swanson had a 230 for high game. Bob Graf and Angel Ricardo teamed up to throw a no hitter, as did Vince McGuire and Todd Elliott of the Falcons.

1979 - The year started with a blizzard that paralyzed the city. A new all-time record was set in the Free Throw contest as Mark Flatley became the first member to ever hit 24 out of 25 shots. Dan Klish won 35 bumper pool games in a row. Mark Flatley was "Mr. Basketball" with 2275 points. Chris Skelnik had the high series in the bowling league of 582. NBC won a gameroom tournament at the McCormick Boys Club. The Cougars set a new record in the LIFT Tournament finals with 1359 points. Ed Forst led the Leader Hockey League with 39 goals and 18 assists as the Rangers won the title. Chris Skelnik scored 4 goals as the Leaders and Staff tied 10-10 in their annual hockey game.

1980 - Mark Flatley tied his record in the Free Throw contest with 24 out of 25 again. This gives him a three year total of 71 out of 75. Steve and Dan Diversey won the ping pong doubles. Dan Diversey was "Mr. Basketball" with 2383 points. Top Gun Safety shooters were Jeff Peck, Joe Poland, Gregg Milner, and Ron Lugo. Hockey playoff winners were the Leopards, Raiders, Bucc, and Wildcats. The Bobcats, Falcons, and Cougars were softball champs. NBC opened its 50th season with 22 football teams. Top vote getters in the All-American balloting were Russ Egan, Dan Diversey, John Blair, and Bill Taylor.

1981 - The hockey champs were the Teen Eagles and Leopards, Tribe Wasps and Wildcats, and Prep Locusts. The Staff ripped the Leaders 15-1 in their hockey game. Steve Diversey set a new record in the Basketball Achievement Contest with 2767 points. The record of 2488 had stood since 1957. The Basketball champs were the Wasps, Cougars, Buccs, and Leopards. The Easter Egg Hunt went very well. Candy prizes were again donated by the Irving-Kedzie Kiwanis, and the eggs were donated by Empire Butter and Egg and the Harris Restaurant. They were boiled and colored by the moms. NBC celebrated its 50th anniversary with a banquet at the O'Hare Holiday Inn. Softball champs were the Prep Locusts and Wasps, Tribe Bees, Cougars, and Spiders, and the Teen Raiders. The NBC Dads Club held a family picnic. The Prep Wasps defeated the Locusts 13-12 to win the title in baseball. The Tribe Red was won by the Buccs over the Cougars, the Bees won the White over the Spartans, and the Falcons defeated the Raiders for the Teen title. The PP&K winners were Scott Goerner, Alan Scaccia, Mark Kielnik, Brian Diebold, Steve Stone, Matt Van Cleave, Tom Shipman, Ed Belcher, Dan Connolly, Matt Rodriguez, Ed Sullins, Mike Geller, Glenn Hamilton, Rich Espy, Frank Giannese, Dave Fonatana, Brian Carter, and Tom Stone. Pumpkin Carving winners were Sean O'Connell, Steve Levy, Paul Goerner, Tom Stone, and Lenny Shipman. Football champs were the Prep Falcons and Bees, and Tribe Raiders and Spiders. The first scholarship winners were announced by James Baumhart of the Alumni. Jim McGuire earned \$3500 for DeVry, and Paul Flatley and Tom Boettjer were awarded \$750. The Prep Bobcat/Cougars won the baseball title over the Bee/Locusts, and the Tribe Falcons won over the Wildcats. Football registration opened, and camps were held for all players. The first place winners in the Punt, Pass, and Kick contest were James Dix, Brian Diebold, Sam Bransky, Lenny Shipman, Brian Brownlow, and Adam Dassow. Pizza parties were being held for the teams. Everyone got caught up in baseball - even the Pirate fans - as the Cubs won the N.L. East. There were 63 participants in the Pumpkin Carving contest. The Cadet winner was Adam Dassow, the Prep winners were Brian Jarvis, Rodney Metzgar, and Pedro Hernandez, and the Tribe winners were Tom Shipman, Jerry Millard, and David Katzin. Rich Rougegen, a former Hornet, was named Tribune Athlete of the Week while playing halfback for Walther Lutheran. Cub pitcher Tim Stoddard and Sox mascot Ribbie were our Sports Day guests. Alumni members Glen Griffin and Howard Wirsan made the event possible. NBC mourned the tragic loss of an outstanding football coach, Tribe Pirate coach Darrell Lowe, in a freak accident. 80 teams shot in the Father and Son Turkey Shoot. The Cadet winners were Stan and Jim Brooks, Joe and Keith Kielnik were the Prep winners, and Al and Jeff Sanders were the Tribe winners. The Mothers Club held a great Holly Fair to raise money for the boys. There were 65 entries in the Poster Contest, and the first place winners were Chris Ridgeway in the Cadet League, Lenny Shipman in the Prep League, and Joe Duffell in the Tribe League. The scoring champs were Joe Bragg of the Cadet Falcons with 17 goals, Prep Bobcat/Cougar Scott Stemmen with 88 points, Tribe East Bobcat Bob Kirby with 38 points, and Tribe West Falcon Tom Seegert with 70 points. Football climaxed with the Pep Rally and Thanksgiving Classics. Special guests at the Pep Rally were former Bear All-Pro Alan Ellis and college official Russ Hartigan. Colleen Moore led the Cheerleaders, and the music was provided by Joe Miceli, Mike Cumberland, Tom and Jean Krier, and Bob and Kathy Papa of the Chicago Continentals. There was snow on the f-elds as the Cadet Pirates won the soccer title, the Bucc/Pirates stopped the Bobcat/Cougars for the Prep title, the Tribe East Bobcats and Wildcats tied for the title, and the Tribe West Falcons won their third title in four years. The Dads Club was organizing a trip to the Stong game.

1985 - The hockey champs were the Cadet Bobcats, Prep Bees, Tribe Falcons and Wasps, and Teen Islanders. The first place winners were John Hall, Lenny Shipman, Don Bianchini, Russ Egan, Tony Bianchini, and Rich Cornacchia. Edition No. 2500 of the Monkeyshine was printed on Feb. 23rd. The first issue came out on Sept. 9, 1932. There were 95 shooters in the Basketball Achievement Contest, and Scott Goerner won "Mr. Basketball" with 2089 points. An all-time record fell as Steve Diversey scored over 2000 points for the 7th year in a row.

DO NOT CUT THROUGH FIELDS

It seems that quite a few members have abad habit of cutting through the fields while other teams are playing. There is no need for this. You are in good enough shape to walk around the fields and have respect for the game which is underway. None of you, particularly the Tribe Bobcats, would want others cutting through during your game. Also, just because your game is over does not mean that the others are. Walk down the sidelines on the way to the Clubhouse.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF A TEAM CAPTAIN

1. Set an example for your teammates by always being fair. It is not only important to see that everyone plays, but to also balance the playing time so that the same players do not always sub and get the minimum playing time. Give every player a chance to start once in a while, and give them extra time when you get free substitution. Try to give everyone a full game once in a while also. Do not give your friends the most time and best positions as this is unfair to everyone. A true sportsman will sub himself and see that no player receives special treatment.
2. Set an example for your teammates by displaying good sportsmanship at all times. The actions of the captain are usually followed by the team. Poor captains argue with the refs, teammates and opponents, yell at each other, get in a fight, or get ejected for swearing. When a teammate steps out of line, remind him of the team, the rules of the game, and the importance of good sportsmanship. Those who show poor sportsmanship do not deserve to start and do not deserve extra playing time.
3. A captain is not the team "boss". He is just there to run the team fairly, just as the refs are there to see that the game is played fairly.
4. Team captains are responsible for the team's players. Captains remind everyone of the next game and meeting, and should help organize the players so that pick each other up for games and call each other to remind them of what is going on. If a player misses a game, it is up to the captain to see that he is called about the next one.
5. Captains bring all team problems to the attention of the Staff.
6. He puts in the starting line up and subs at each game.
7. He never tells another player not to show up, nor does he allow another teammate to do so.
8. He sets players in positions based on the good of the team. He shifts players around when possible to give them experience and find out what they are best at.

TAKE CARE OF FOOTBALL EQUIPMENT

Make sure that you do your best to take good care of the expensive equipment we are letting you use. Clean the helmet each week with a mild soap (non-abrasive) and a plastic scouring pad (not SOS) or brush. Tighten all of the screw after each game and practice so that they do not loosen up and fall out. Be sure to keep the inside clean, too. Make sure that the earpads remain clipped on, and take special care of the forehead pad on the new helmets. Several boys have claimed that someone stole theirs when they left the helmet laying around. That is a silly risk to take with something that will cost you \$60. Hold it or wear it and you will have no problems. Stickers are not allowed, but lights will have a taped stripe to identify them. Below are the charges for lost or stolen equipment.
